2009 Tournament Information and Notes

WHAT: 38th Annual OHSAA Football Tournaments (State Semifinals/ Fourth Round)

WHEN/WHERE: Friday, Nov. 27 Divisions II, III and V; Saturday, Nov. 28 Divisions I, IV and VI; neutral sites as selected by the OHSAA.

TIMES: Regional and state semifinal games on Friday begin at 7:30; games on Saturday begin at 7:00.

FORMAT: Thirty-two teams in six divisions (192 total schools) qualified for the tournaments, with selections based on the OHSAA Football Computer Rankings. To qualify for the tournaments, schools must have finished first through eighth in their assigned region.

ADMISSION: \$8.00 per person presale; \$10.00 per person at the gate.

MEDIA/COACHES TELECONFERENCE NOV. 30: The OHSAA will again host a media/coaches teleconference on the Monday prior to the state finals. The teleconference is scheduled for Monday, Nov. 30 and begins at 11:15 a.m. Each coach will have 15 minutes to respond to questions from the media. MEDIA CREDENTIALS/PAIRINGS UPDATE: Media members desiring credentials for the first four rounds should contact the host site manager or media coordinator. An updated list of game sites, site managers or media coordinators and telephone numbers will be posted on the

OHSAA web site (www.ohsaa.org) no later than Tuesday, Nov. 17. To find the updated pairings, go to the "Sports" dropdown box in the left-hand corner of the home page followed by "Football." The final computer rankings are available at the same area of the web site.

THE SEMIFINALISTS: Of the 24 teams to reach the state semifinals, eight are here for the first time (see chart, bottom page 6). There are two match-ups pitting teams who are both in the semifinals for the first time. The first occurs Friday in Division II when Columbus Marion-Franklin faces Cincinnati Winton Woods. The second happens Saturday in Division IV when Chagrin Falls faces Ottawa-Glandorf. By contrast, the semifinal showdown in Division III between Youngstown Mooney and Steubenville features two teams that are combining to make their 27th appearance in the semifinals (14 for Mooney, 13 for Steubenville). WHICH SEEDS REMAIN: Only one state semifinal game features two number one seeds. No. 1 seed Youngstown Cardinal Mooney will face No. 1 seed Steubenville in a Division III state semifinal game. Division I is the only division to not have a No. 1 seed advance to the semifinals. Here is the breakdown of seeds remaining: No. 1 (7), No. 2 (6), No. 3 (2), No. 4 (1), No. 5 (4), No. 6 (3), No. 7 (0) and No. 8 (1).

FIRST-TIME PARTICIPANTS EXPERIENCE SOME SUCCESS: There were 14 schools that made their first appearance in the OHSAA football tournaments this year and Grove City Christian (Div. VI, Region 23) is the last standing and will face Norwalk St. Paul in a state semifinal

matchup.

The number of first-time participants by year include 12 in 2008, 14 in 2007, 10 in 2006, 12 in 2005, 16 in 2004, 12 in 2003, 21 in 2002, 17 in 2001, 26 in 2000 and 32 in 1999.

MAN VS. COMPUTER: Every team in each Division's Top 10 Associated Press final poll qualified for the playoffs. Of those 60 teams (10 ranked in each division), 15 remain alive in the tournaments. See page 6 of this release for the statewide AP polls and the remaining teams in bold.

NOTING THE UNDEFEATED: Thirty teams began the playoffs without a loss. After the regional final round, 16 of those 30 remained, and heading into the state semifinals there are now eight unbeaten teams still playing. There are no unbeaten teams left in Division I or Division II and none of the state semifinal games feature two undefeated teams.

ELEVENTH YEAR WITH 192 QUALIFIERS: This is the 11th year that the OHSAA football tournament field consisted of 192 total qualifiers. Each of the 24 regions qualified eight teams to the tournaments, which consist of five rounds. The first round is the regional quarterfinals, and teams that finish first through fourth in their regions in the final OHSAA computer rankings served as hosts. The OHSAA designates neutral sites for regional semifinal, regional final and state semifinal games, and no rebracketing will occur until the state semifinals.

DEFENDING STATE CHAMPS: Of the six 2008 state champions, three remain alive in the playoffs, including Kettering Archbishop Alter in Division IV, Youngstown Ursuline in Division V and Delphos St. John's in Division VI.

Defending Division I champion Cleveland St. Ignatius lost in the regional semifinals, defending Division II champion Sylvania Southview did not qualify for the playoffs (moved up to Division I) and defending Division III champion Aurora lost in the regional quarterfinals (moved up to Division II).

FOOTBALL SCHOOLS: There were 718 football-playing schools this year. The division breakdowns are:

- Division I: 120 schools (enrollments of 518 or more);
- Division II: 118 schools (enrollments of 348 through 517);
- Division III: 120 schools (enrollments of 252 through 347);
- Division IV: 119 schools (enrollments of 177 through 251);
- Division V: 120 schools (enrollments of 125 through 176);
- Division VI: 121 schools (enrollments of 124 or less).

Divisions are based on enrollments of males in grades 9 through 11 as reported to the State Department of Education.

FOOTBALL STATS: Media members around the state are encouraged to submit any of their area statistical leaders to the OHSAA in order to compile a statewide statistical leader board. Media may submit their area leaders in any format to Tim Stried by email at tstried@ohsaa.org or by fax at 614-267-1677. Statwide leaders are currently posted on the football page at www.ohsaa.org.

STADIUMS TOP THE LIST: Canton Fawcett Stadium and Massillon Paul Brown Tiger Stadium were named No. 1 and 10, respectively, among the nation's best high school football stadiums, as voted by ESPN last year. The complete story is located on the football page at www.ohsaa.org.

FOOTBALL FINALS CREDENTIALS: The media credential request form for the state football finals is posted on the OHSAA website under the 'News & Media' tab from the main navigation bar. The form must be filled out and either mailed or faxed to Tim Stried at the OHSAA at 614-267-1677 by Tues., Dec. 1.

STATE FOOTBALL FINALS TICKET BOOKS ON SALE: Ticket books for all six state football championship games are currently on sale through the Canton/Stark County Convention and Visitors' Bureau. The state football finals are Dec. 4 and 5 at Fawcett Stadium in Canton and Paul Brown Tiger Stadium in Massillon. Tickets can be ordered on-line at www.ohsaaffinals.com. Ticket books are \$48.00 for the six games.

Also available are prepaid two-day parking passes for \$10.00, prepaid two-day motor home parking passes for \$20.00 and state tournament souvenir programs for \$4.00 (a savings of \$1.00 from the price at the games). Priority seating will be assigned on a first-come, first-served basis. There will be a \$3.00 ticket processing fee per order and a \$2.00 postage fee per order. FINALS LIVE ON STO: SportsTime Ohio and Time Warner Cable will provide exclusive live coverage of the state football finals Dec. 4 and 5 from Canton and Massillon. The companies will also televise up to eight regional and state semifinal contests during the first four rounds of the OHSAA tournaments. STO/TWC have the exclusive first right of refusal to select contests each round of the tournaments to air on either a live or tape-delayed basis. Other networks will have the opportunity to televise other regional or state semifinal contests not selected by STO/TWC on a tape-delayed basis only.

HOW THE SEEDS FARED: Home teams in the regional quarterfinals (seeds 1-4) went 66-30 overall for a .688 winning percentage. The top seed in each region wasn't the safest place to be in the first round. Seven No. 8 seeds, including Canton McKinley, Columbus Marion-Franklin, Springfield Shawnee, Pemberville Eastwood, St. Henry, Bascom Hopewell-Loudon and Covington, upset No. 1 seeds. Out of the 24 regions, only five regions saw all top seeds advance. Every lower seed in Region 24, Div. VI (Covington, Maria Stein Marion Local, Fort Loramie and South Charleston Southeastern) recorded an upset.

MAKING A HABIT OF THIS: Ten schools made at least their 20th appearance in the OHSAA football tournaments in 2009.

- Div. I: Cleveland St. Ignatius (22nd) and Cincinnati Archbishop Moeller (28th).
- Div. III: Youngstown Cardinal Mooney (23rd), Columbus St. Francis DeSales (20th), Columbus Bishop Watterson (20th) and Steubenville (22nd).
- Div. IV: Orrville (20th) and Ironton (27th).
- Div. V: Wheelersburg (22nd).
- Div. VI: Mogadore (23rd).

WELCOME BACK: Galion won a state championship in 1985 and qualified for the playoffs in 1986 and 1989, and the Tigers were back in the postseason for the first time since then as an undefeated qualifier in Division IV, Region 14. That 20-year span represents the longest playoff drought of any school in the 2009 tournament that is not making its first appearance. Two schools were back in the postseason for the first time in 19 years, those being Middletown and Heath. Both teams lost in the regional semifinals.

MOST TOURNAMENT WINS: There are 18 schools that have at least 30 OHSAA tournament victories. Fifteen of those schools qualified for the 2009 playoffs, led by Cleveland St. Ignatius with 55 postseason wins. See pages 7-10 of this release for the complete list.

Newark Catholic, which did not qualify for the playoffs this season, leads the state with 62 playoff wins. The other two schools with 30 or more playoff wins which are not in the 2009 postseason are Versailles (45) and Cleveland Benedictine (34).

STILL STREAKING: Defending Division I champion Cleveland St. Ignatius made its 22nd-consecutive state tournament appearance, which is the most among all qualifiers.

Columbus St. Francis DeSales (Division III) returns for a 16th straight time, while Coldwater (Division V) is in for the 13th year in a row. Those two schools have both advanced to the regional finals.

Since 1985, Ironton has missed the playoffs only three times. Since 1986, Wheelersburg has been absent from the postseason only three times. Columbus Bishop Watterson is in the tournament for the 10th time in the last 11 years (missed in 2007) and for the 15th time in the last 17 years (also missed in 1998). Germantown Valley View, meanwhile, is in the playoffs for the 16th time in the last 18 years (missed in 2006 and 2004).

Division I: Fourth-ranked Cleveland St. Ignatius built a 21-0 lead and held on to top fifth-ranked Cincinnati Elder, 28-20, for the OHSAA Division I football state championship at Canton Fawcett Stadium.

St. Ignatius senior quarterback Andrew Holland completed 12-of-22 passes for 208 yards and three touchdowns to lead the Wildcats, who overcame a record-setting performance from Elder junior quarterback Mark Miller, who set Division I state championship game records with 399 yards passing and 27 completions.

The 10 state titles for St. Ignatius builds on its state record for most championships, which is now two more than the next school on the list (Newark Catholic with eight). The next Division I school on the list is Cincinnati Archbishop Moeller with seven titles.

St. Ignatius and Elder have now combined for 12 state championships since 1988, but it marked the first time they had met to decide the title. St. Ignatius' stretch of 21-consecutive years in the state playoffs is the longest in the state and its all-time postseason win total of 55 is the second-most (Newark Catholic, 62).

One play after Miller was shaken up, Elder backup quarterback Joe Hetzer's two-yard touchdown pass to junior Tim O'Connor with 1:22 left in the game brought the game to within one possession, but St. Ignatius recovered the ensuing onside kick and ran out the clock to end the game.

Miller was 27-for-50 in the game, which also marks a Division I state record for attempts, and his 399 yards is the fifth-most among all divisions in a state championship game. His favorite target was O'Connor, whose 15 receptions are a state record among all divisions and his 184 yards ranks seventh (fourth among Division I games).

Holland threw two of his three touchdown passes in the first quarter, both 21-yard tosses, to junior Brenden Carozzoni with 8:28 left and senior Connor Ryan with 25 seconds left. When senior Patrick Hinkel scored from two yards out with 8:56 left before halftime, the Wildcats were in control, up 21-0.

Scoring once in the second, third and fourth quarters, Elder tallied three of the next four touchdowns to get back in the game as Miller found O'Connor from nine yards out with 3:10 left in the second quarter and senior Josh Jones from 45 yards away with 6:07 left in the third.

Holland's 51-yard pass to Ryan with 17 seconds left in the third quarter marked St. Ignatius' final touchdown, putting the Wildcats up 28-13 before Elder's last score.

Division II: Sylvania Southview senior quarterback Alex Pidcock accounted for all 80 yards on the game-winning drive, including a 16-yard touchdown pass to senior Paul Murphey with 32 seconds left, as the Cougars came from behind to beat defending state champion Cincinnati Anderson 29-25 in the Division II football state championship game at Massillon Paul Brown Tiger Stadium.

The win gives the sixth-ranked Cougars their first state title and caps a perfect 15-0 season. Anderson, which began its postseason run unranked, ends its season 12-3.

Pidcock completed 23-of-30 passes for a Division II state championship record 333 yards. His favorite target, senior Shaun Joplin, caught eight passes for a Division II state championship record 166 yards and a touchdown.

Pidcock also rushed for 66 yards and a touchdown.

Southview intercepted an Anderson pass on its own 1-yard line with 6:19 to play and took a safety on fourth down with 4:44 left rather than risk a blocked punt in the end zone. Anderson looked to spoil the tactic when junior Kyle Slater scored on a 20-yard run – his third touchdown of the game – with 2:33 remaining to put the Redskins on top, 25-22.

But Pidcock led Southview 80 yards in 2:01 for the comeback win. Beginning at his own 20-yard, Pidcock completed a pair of 18-yard passes, ran twice for gains of eight and 14 yards, then passed for six more to advance the ball to Anderson's 16-yard line. Pidcock then eluded a diving defender, moved out of the pocket to his right and found Murphey open in the middle of the field and he scampered into the end zone untouched.

Anderson drove the ball into Cougar territory in the short time the Redskins had to work with, but a desperation heave on the final play was knocked down to end the game.

It was a back-and-forth game that saw 765 yards in total offense (300 for Anderson, 465 for Southview) and seven lead changes.

Southview scored on a Hail-Mary pass just before halftime when Pidcock connected with freshman Allen Gant on a 38-yard strike that tipped in the air off another Sylvania receiver and an Anderson defender. That gave the Cougars a 16-13 lead at the intermission, but Anderson tied the game on senior John Howard's 33-yard field goal with 8:18 left in the third quarter.

Slater rushed for 177 yards on 26 carries to go along with his three scores. Redskin senior quarterback Daniel Rod completed 7-of-12 passes for 80 yards.

Division III: Aurora scored touchdowns on all three of its second quarter possessions, two of which came off Eastmoor turnovers, and the Greenmen went on to win the OHSAA Division III football state championship 21-10 at Canton Fawcett Stadium.

It marks the first state championship for Aurora (13-2), which rebounded from a 1-2 start and beat defending state champion Sunbury Big Walnut in the state semifinals.

Aurora senior quarterback Brendan Gallagher was 7-of-15 passing for 120 yards and two touchdowns – a 49-yarder to senior Dee Brizzolara with 8:39 left in the second quarter and a 26-yarder to senior Steven Yung with 52 seconds left before halftime. Those two scoring strikes, coupled with a three-yard touchdown run by junior Eric Schultz, proved to be enough to send the Greenmen to the title.

Field position was controlled in large part by Aurora senior Andy Heacox, who punted five times for a 43.4 yard average and placed two punts inside the 20-yard line. He also kicked all three extra points and had seven tackles on defense.

Eastmoor (13-2) out-gained Aurora 297-191, had 17 first downs compared to 10 for Aurora, and averaged 5.0 yards per play, but a fumble and two interceptions halted potential scoring drives.

The Warriors kicked a 35-yard field goal on their first possession after intercepting an Aurora pass, but the Warriors did not score again until a 12 play, 93-yard drive in the third quarter. Eastmoor had the ball back twice, but could not produce points.

Aurora junior Eric Schultz led the Greenmen with eight tackles, a quarterback sack and an interception.

Eastmoor senior quarterback Malon Johnson completed 10-of-19 passes for 152 yards and a touchdown, a 30-yard pass to senior Alex Coleman. Coleman had 10 receptions, which set a Division III state finals record.

Division IV: Sixth-seeded Kettering Archbishop Alter built a 21-0 lead and went on to beat top-seeded Steubenville 21-6 in the OHSAA Division IV football state championship.

In winning its first state title, fifth-ranked Alter rushed for 303 yards in the game, which led to an 11-minute advantage in time of possession. It was a rematch of the 2006 Division III state championship game that saw Steubenville hold off Alter for a 34-33 victory and the Big Red's fourth state title.

Second-ranked Steubenville had a pair of 10-play drives in the first half, but came up empty both times. The Big Red had won their four previous playoff games by an average of 21.5 points, but on their first six possessions, they punted four times and turned the ball over twice – once on downs the other on an interception.

Alter, meanwhile, scored touchdowns to cap off drives of seven, eight and 10 plays behind a pair of 100-yard rushers – senior running back Chris Borland, who had 130 yards on 15 carries, and senior quarterback Austin Boucher, who had 111 yards on 19 carries.

Boucher completed 7-of-11 passes for 81 yards and an eight-yard touchdown to Borland with 4:54 left in the first quarter.

Steubenville junior quarterback Dwight Macon threw for 196 yards on 11-of-22 passing and also led the Big Red in rushing with 68 yards on 14 carries. His 33-yard touchdown pass to junior Trey Wiggins with 9:43 left in the game capped a five-play, 67 yard drive, but Steubenville lost the ball on downs to end its last possession.

Junior Connor Cummins and junior Tom Armstrong both had interceptions for Alter, while Borland posted a team-high six and a half tackles. Senior Philip Sowar had two tackles behind the line of scrimmage, including a 13-yard quarterback sack.

Division V: Top-ranked Youngstown Ursuline scored three second-half touchdowns, including two on interception returns in the final four minutes of the game, and shut out third-ranked Findlay Liberty-Benton 21-0 in the OHSAA football Division V state championship game at Massillon Paul Brown Tiger Stadium.

It marks the second state championship for Ursuline (15-0), which won its first state title in 2000. The Fighting Irish were the 2007 state runner-up, falling to Maria Stein Marion Local, 20-14.

Liberty-Benton (14-1) had scored at least 34 points in four previous playoff wins and had outscored opponents 649-36 throughout the season. The Eagles out-gained Ursuline 241-152 in total yardage and had 17 first downs compared to eight for Ursuline, but they threw four interceptions that were returned for a combined 178 yards, including touchdowns of 44 yards by senior Dale Peterman with 4:20 left to play and 40 yards by senior LaVance Turnage with 2:57 remaining.

Liberty-Benton junior quarterback Aaron Craft completed 18-of-27 passes for 157 yards, but Ursuline sacked him four times. Craft rushed 24 times and gained 79 yards, but sacks cost him 30 yards for a net gain of 49 yards.

Prior to Peterman's 44-yard interception return for a touchdown, he returned his first interception 40 yards and added four tackles. Sophomore Jeff Podolsky led the Fighting Irish with nine tackles and a sack, while junior Jamel Turner had seven and a half stops and one and a half sacks.

Following a scoreless first half, junior running back Allen Jones put Ursuline on the board a little over a minute into the third quarter with a 59-yard touchdown scamper.

Division VI: Winning its fifth state football championship in five tries, Delphos St. John's scored the game's final 27 points and held the ball in the second half for all but four minutes and 26 seconds to top previously undefeated Bascom Hopewell-Loudon, 34-14.

The Blue Jays finished the season 13-2 and their two losses during the regular season were both to defending state champions in their own Midwest Athletic Conference (Marion Local and Coldwater).

The state runner-up in 2007, Hopewell-Loudon (14-1) scored a pair of touchdowns in the first quarter, but had only three possessions in the second half and turned the ball over to St. John's each time with a pair of interceptions and a fumble.

St. John's took control to start the second half with an eight play, 77-yard drive that took 8:49 off the clock, capped by a six-yard touchdown run by sophomore Jordan Leininger. The Blue Jays kept the ball for 19:34 of the final 24 minutes in the game.

Overall, St. John's held the ball for 32:11 and gained 389 yards, including 299 on the ground. Junior quarterback Wes Ulm ran for 198 yards on 24 carries and a touchdown, a 26-yarder to tie the game at 14-14 with 7:16 left in the first half. Two of his three completions in the game went for touchdowns, including a 26-yarder to senior Jay Leininger with 50 seconds left before halftime to give the Blue Jays their first lead.

Leininger scored three touchdowns for St. John's – a nine-yard run in the first quarter, a six-yard run in the third quarter and a 53-yard pass in the fourth quarter from Ulm.

St. John's sophomore AJ Klausing and senior Brad Hoffman both had interceptions.

Hopewell-Loudon, which averaged 42 points in its four previous playoff games, was held to 238 total yards. The Chieftains, have only two losses the last two seasons, both of which came in the state championship game.

Senior Jay Yost had eight catches for 105 yards and a touchdown for Hopewell-Loudon.
