2009 IN REVIEW

Division I

Mt. Notre Dame beat Toledo Start in the finals, 52-38, to become the second school in history to win four consecutive titles. They were paced by Kathryn Reynolds and Gabby Smith with 13 points each. Kendall Hackney scored 12 despite sitting out much of the second half in foul trouble.

Start was paced by Yolanda Richardson's 15 points and Maleeka Kynard's 12 points, including three 3-pointers.

Following a stretch of sloppy play and ineffectiveness - much of which came after Hackney picked up her third foul midway through the second quarter - Mount Notre Dame found itself and returned to form to run away with the ballgame in the fourth quarter.

Speaking of juxtaposition, check out the first half of this game. After jumping out to a 9-0 lead, Mount Notre Dame led 17-5 after the first eight minutes. Mount Notre Dame thrived off of 10 Start turnovers resulting in 14 points.

And therein lies the difference. In the second quarter, Start cut down their turnovers with just five in the quarter and Mount Notre Dame scored 0 points off those five turnovers. It also didn't help the Cougars that they lost Hackney to her third foul. Hackney scored seven first half points before being forced to the bench.

Start got seven points from Richardson in the first half, though she could have had more following some missed layups. Kynard contributed six as Start cut the halftime deficit to 21-15.

Division II

The Division II state final pitted Wapakoneta, a school that had never won a state championship in any sport, against Hathaway Brown, a team trying to avoid becoming the first team to lose three straight state championship games.

As it turns out, neither team made history.

Hathaway Brown claimed the Division II championship with a 52-46 win over Wapakoneta in Value City Arena in Columbus. The Blazers, who trailed throughout the first half, were paced by Erica Almady's 13 points. Heidi Schlegel scored 17 points for the Redskins.

Hathaway Brown came out of the locker room strong in the second half to lead for most of the third quarter. All was not well for the Blazers, however, as Mylan Woods picked up her fourth foul with 4:36 to play. Wapakoneta seized the momentum and retook the lead at 34-33 at the break. Still, the Redskins may look back on the Blazers' 10-14 shooting in the third quarter and their own nine turnovers that led to 14 Hathaway Brown points as the beginning of the end.

Alanna Guy and Devon Golden traded shots early in the fourth, with Golden accounting for Wapakoneta's first seven points. Guy scored 10 in the quarter. Then, with 4:13 to play, Woods, who had returned just 13 seconds earlier, picked up her fifth foul and was forced to watch the remainder of the evening.

Her teammates stepped up, especially Almady, who made four free

throws to seal the game and the championship - and to help her team avoid the type of history in which it didn't want to be associated.

"We just had some kids step up and play major roles [when Mylan Woods] fouled out," said Blazers' head coach Paul Barlow. "Our kids got a little more focused on defense and we won the basketball game."

Division III

The Regina Royals were Division III state champions for the sixth time. This time around, they did it without a loss but not without a fight from a resilient Oak Hill team.

The Oaks were behind 55-38 after three quarters but proceeded to make things interesting in the fourth, running off eight straight points to start the quarter and playing ferocious defense to stifle a Regina team that was previously cruising on offense. The Royals turned the ball over eight times in the final quarter, matching their total for the first three quarters combined.

In the end, though, Regina had too much talent while Oak Hill had too little shooting. The Royals were aided by 3-for-19 3-point shooting from the Oaks, while the Royals connected on 6-for-10, including six from Amber Boyd to win the ball game, 63-48.

Regina was paced by Boyd's 23 points and got 12 points from Riley McCormick. Oak Hill got 15 points and 8 rebounds from Rebecca Puckett and 16 points and seven rebounds from Lakin Caudill.

Oak Hill was able to stay within striking distance in the first quarter thanks to 6-for-12 shooting from the field. The Royals thrived off of four Oaks turnovers leading to six points on the other end. Regina took an 18-13 lead to the second quarter.

That second quarter was the Oaks' unraveling. Oak Hill shot just 4-for-16 in the quarter and turned the ball over five more times. The Oaks also only made 1-of-9 three pointers in the quarter. Regina, meanwhile, continued to shoot well, making 5-of-10 in the second quarter including three 3-pointers highlighted by Boyd's 30-foot shot at the halftime buzzer. Boyd scored 15 first half points including four 3-pointers.

Division IV

The Division IV state championship rematch looked like it was going to go the same way it did in 2008. Trailing by 15 points at the half, Columbus Africentric outscored Berlin Hiland 44-20 in the second half to prevent a repeat from happening.

"Last year, I think we just came into the game thinking we were just going to win it," said Raven Ferguson. "We told ourselves we've got to come back next year and we can not fall short."

Led by Ferguson's 17 points and Ashar Harris' 14 points and 15 rebounds, the Nubians completed an improbable comeback to stun the Hawks, 55-46, at Value City Arena in Columbus.

The Nubians dialed up the defensive pressure in the third quarter in scoring 24 points in the frame. A Harris steal and layup with 1:55 to play cut the Hiland lead to 38-29. By the time Chelsea Chambers (five points) made a three with five seconds to play, Africentric had made a game of it, ending the quarter trailing 40-35.

Africentric struggled from the field throughout the first half, shooting just 5-for-29. The Nubians first basket of the game didn't come until the 2:04 mark of the first quarter when Brein Babbs scored to end Hiland's 7-0 run to start the game. Chambers hit a shot at the buzzer for Africentric to cut the first quarter deficit to 9-4.

The second quarter belonged to Hiland, outscoring Africentric 17-7. The Hawks shot 6-for-12 from the field in the quarter and continued to capitalize on Africentric turnovers, finishing the half with seven points off of six Nubians turnovers.

Hiland expanded their lead to 26-11 heading into the locker room. In the end, though, Africentric took the momentum and the title.

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2009 IN REVIEW

Division I

There’s an old adage in sports that says “big-time players make big plays.”

Jared Sullinger hit two free throws with 2.7 seconds left to give Northland a dramatic 60-58 victory over Princeton and the Division I state championship.

Ohio’s Mr. Basketball, playing on his future home court at Ohio State, stepped up to the line and calmly sank his first two free throws after he was fouled on a three-pointer.

The junior 6-foot-8 center, who finished with 15 points and 11 rebounds, received the inbounds pass at midcourt with 7.5 seconds left and the score knotted at 58-58. He drove to his right and pulled up at the top of the key where he was raked across his shooting arm, sending hysteria into the crowd of 12,104.

“I went into the huddle and said ‘I want the ball,’” explained Sullinger about what occurred during the timeout prior to his game-winning play. “Not trying to be selfish, but I wanted the ball (in that spot).”

It was an appropriate finish for the two evenly matched programs that finished first and second, respectively, in the final AP regular season poll.

Each team had to modify its attack in the early going as two marquee players got into early foul trouble. Princeton’s Marquise Horne and Northland’s J.D. Weatherspoon each picked up two fouls in the first four minutes and were relegated to the bench the remainder of the half.

Orlando Williams sank two free throws to stake Princeton to a 10-9 lead early in the second, but freshman Jordan Potts - seeing increased

playing time due to Weatherspoon’s foul issues - hit his second three of the game to put Northland back on top.

Despite Northland retaining a slim lead, head coach Satch Sullinger wasn’t pleased with the ever-quickening pace of the game. He prompted his players to “slow down!” during a timeout following a turnover.

Northland must have listened to their venerable coach, as they focused on slowing the tempo and feeding the ball into Jared Sullinger in the post. It resulted in a 21-15 halftime lead with Sullinger leading the way with eight points and six boards.

Sullinger bumped the lead out to double-digits at 30-20 with a fierce two-handed dunk off an offensive rebound and free throw midway through the third. Weatherspoon’s inside presence allowed Sullinger to see fewer double teams and he took advantage of the extra breathing room.

A Jordan Sibert layup off a steal cut it to 30-24 with three minutes left, but any momentum was lost when Weatherspoon threw down a crowd-pleasing two-handed dunk off an alley-oop on the ensuing possession.

Sibert did his best to keep Princeton in the game, scoring five quick points in the fourth including a deep three from the corner. But Northland failed to yield, finding a way to respond usually behind Sullinger or Weatherspoon in the paint.

The Vikings continued to push the issue, generating easy baskets off transition. Sibert’s layup with 3:51 remaining cut the Northland lead to just four at 50-46.

Once again, however, Weatherspoon silenced the raucous Princeton faithful with a monstrous dunk. Dimonde Hale dished it to Weatherspoon on the fast break and the he hammered a one-hander to push the lead back out to seven.

With under a minute remaining, Sibert sank two free throws to cut the Northland lead to 57-53. Following a timeout, Northland was called for a five –second violation under its own basket and turned the ball over.

Princeton’s Williams parlayed the gaffe into a crucial three-pointer and Princeton trailed by only one with 27.6 seconds remaining.

After Trey Burke split a pair of free throws, Williams was fouled on three-point attempt and sank two-of-three, tying the game at 58-58 with 7.5 seconds left on the clock and setting up Sullinger’s heroics.

Division II

It’s always good to have the King on your sideline.

With Cleveland Cavaliers star LeBron James cheering on his alma mater from behind the bench, Akron St. Vincent-St. Mary overcame a big-time performance by Thurgood Marshall junior Juwan Staten to capture the Division II state championship with a hard-fought 59-53 victory at The Ohio State University’s Value City Arena.

Daylen Harrison scored 21 points for the Fighting Irish, which captured its first state title since 2003 (James’ senior year), and fifth overall.

“This is about a tradition that’s grown bigger than any of us,” said St. Vincent-St. Mary head coach Dru Joyce after the game. “We just had the opportunity to write another chapter.”

“(LeBron) is part of the program and he believes in what we do,” Joyce said of his former player and NBA megastar in attendance.

The teams battled back and forth throughout the first quarter as the lead changed four times. Staten, Thurgood Marshall’s dynamic point guard, got off to a blazing start. The University of Dayton recruit scored nine of the Cougars’ 13 first-quarter points and his reverse layup at the first quarter buzzer gave Thurgood Marshall a 13-11 lead.

Staten continued his stellar shooting in the second. He canned two 3’s as Thurgood Marshall pushed its lead out to six when Staten found

DeAngelo Gates streaking in for a layup and a 24-18 lead with 1:40 left in the half.

The All-Ohio guard wasn't done there, however, adding two more buckets in the final minute as the Cougars went to the locker room with a 29-24 halftime lead. Staten scored 20 first-half points on 8-of-13 shooting, including four three-pointers.

The Fighting Irish chipped away at the Cougars' lead in the third quarter and found ways to slow down Staten. Senior Michael Hammonds' three-pointer from the left baseline with 2:10 left in the third tied it up at 36-36.

"In the locker room (at halftime) we knew we had to play some defense or we weren't going to win," admitted Harrison.

The Irish rally continued as Ricky Johnson Jr. banked in a driving layup down the lane to give the Fighting Irish their first lead since early in the game and they extended the lead out to four on Hammond's layup.

Thurgood Marshall ended the quarter on an (unlikely) high note. Junior center Tremayne Scott, who just checked in the ballgame, calmly drilled a three-pointer from the left wing at the buzzer, cutting the Cougars' deficit to just one at 40-39 heading into the final eight minutes.

SVSM pushed its lead back out to four, but resilient Thurgood Marshall wouldn't fold, reeling off six straight to recapture a 47-45 lead.

The lead continued to change hands, as the Fighting Irish went back on top with two straight Hammond layups. But Gates responded with a three-pointer and Staten followed with layup for a 52-49 Marshall lead with just over two minutes left.

With LeBron biting his nails from his courtside seat, Johnson tied it with a clutch three-pointer with 1:40 left. His steal and outlet past to Beard for a layup on the next possession put St. Vincent-St. Mary back out on top 54-52.

From there the Irish were able to cling to their miniscule lead and held off Staten down the stretch. The Irish iced the game when Harrison stroked four free throws in the final 10 seconds to clinch the victory.

Staten was only able to muster eight points in the second half but still finished with a game high 28 to go along with four assists.

"He's a great player," said Hammond following the game. "I think we just wore him out in the second half."

LeBron took Staten aside as the teams shook hands following the game and had a few personal words with the budding star.

Joyce perhaps summed up the contest best.

"It was said to me in 2002 when we lost the state title 'you had a great player but they had a great team,'" Joyce said, referring to the Irish dropping the championship to Roger Bacon despite having James.

"Tonight we had a great team and they had a great player."

Division III

When you set a state championship game record for fewest points allowed in a game, victory is a sure thing.

Such was the case for Cleveland Central Catholic, which used a stifling early defensive effort to capture the Division III state championship with a 45-38 victory over Defiance Tinora at Value City Arena.

The Ironmen held Tinora scoreless in the first quarter, limited the Rams to 27 percent shooting (14-of-52), and forced 17 turnovers. Tinora's 38 points were the fewest in Division III title game history. Belpre High School scored 39 in 1993.

"I thought our pressure was fantastic," said emotional Central Catholic head coach Kevin Noch in his post-game press conference.

"Our quickness and a few of our blocked shots made them not shoot the ball with a lot of confidence."

Central Catholic got out of the gates quickly, capitalizing off five Tinora turnovers in the first four minutes. Two Chall Montgomery jumpers and an Anton Grady putback gave the Ironmen an early 6-0 advantage.

Things didn't go well at all for Tinora early, as it had to overcome an injury to emotional leader Treg Lymanstall, who got tangled up with Montgomery with 3:49 left in the first on a loose ball. Lymanstall rolled his right ankle and had to be helped off the court, but he would return in limited action.

Tinora missed their first nine shots of the game, allowing Central Catholic to get out in space and take advantage of their athleticism. Grady's two-handed dunk off the fast break and Shawni Jackson's running jumper at the buzzer pushed the Ironmen's lead out to 11-0 after one.

Tinora's goose egg in the first quarter tied a record for the fewest points ever in a quarter in state title game history. The last time it happened was 1931.

"Its always defense," said Montgomery. "That's what we always work on in practice."

The Rams battled back mightily in the second, going on a 14-1 run to open the quarter. Gregg Gerken and Jon Garmyn keyed the rally, combining to score the first 11 points in a four minute span to bring Tinora back to 12-11. Senior Taylor Wiemken then gave the Rams their first lead of the game with a layup with 3:30 left in the half.

"They're a good team," explained Grady when asked how Tinora was able to fight back. "They didn't get here by mistake."

Montgomery ended the Central Catholic scoring drought with a three-pointer to put the Ironmen back up to stay entering intermission.

Gerken nailed four free throws in the first minute of the second half to give the Rams an 18-17 lead, but Central Catholic responded with a 14-5 run over the next six minutes to push the lead back out to eight points.

The Ironmen saw their lead grow to double digits at 40-28 in the fourth. Montgomery sank a three-pointer, Brandon Campbell put in a layup and Grady was able to lay-in a spinning underhand shot off a feed from Campbell.

Grady, who recorded a game-high 19 points and eight rebounds in the Ironmen's semifinal win, was held in check by Tinora. He finished with just six points (3-of-11 FG), but did add three blocks and two steals.

Montgomery, Derrick Bufford and Campbell certainly picked up the slack. Montgomery posted a team-high 16 points and six rebounds while Bufford and Campbell each tallied 10. Campbell also dished out six assists.

"I say Chall really showed what he could do (today)," said Noch, when asked who he thought was the game's MVP. "But it was really our defense."

It was the first boys state title for Cleveland Central Catholic in any sport. The small parochial school on the Cleveland's eastside only has 182 boys, but played much bigger.

"I've never been more proud of 13 guys in my life," Noch stated triumphantly.

Division IV

Ryan Borden sank three-pointers in the final seconds of both regulation and the first overtime as Oak Hill captured its first ever state championship with a dramatic 48-43 double overtime victory over Kalida in the Division IV title game Saturday morning at Value City Arena.

Borden, a 6-foot-2 senior, hit a falling-away three-pointer from the left corner with 17 seconds left in regulation to knot the score at 33-33 and force the first overtime.

"I've seen him hit shots like that," said Oak Hill head coach Norm Persin. "When he gets in a rhythm he can hit shots like that."

In the first extra session, the Oaks again faced a three point deficit at 38-35 after Kalida's Jordan Basinger converted two free throws. But Borden came to the rescue again, calmly sinking a contested three-pointer from the left wing with 30 seconds remaining.

"Not very good at all," admitted Borden when asked of his look at the basket on the shot. "My feet were tangled and I basically shot it falling down."

Oak Hill then pulled away in the second overtime period. Borden gave the Oaks the lead for good at 42-41 with a backdoor layup and Western Hale and Kyle Ondera iced the game with four straight free throws down the stretch.

"God, did they battle," Persin said. "They just refused to lose. It's a tremendous feeling."

The first four quarters featured a series of back-and-forth scoring runs but hardly the drama of the final eight minutes.

Kalida opened up quickly out of the gate, scoring the first seven points of the contest. Senior guard Justin Kahle nailed a three-pointer from the left baseline to open the scoring and added a driving layup two possessions later.

Up 9-3 with just over a minute remaining in the first quarter, Kalida was happy to let the air out of the ball as Oak Hill was content to sit in its trademark 2-3 zone defense. Kahle let the final minute of the clock run out dribbling uncontested near midcourt, leading to the surprisingly low score at the end of one.

"We knew if they had the lead they would try to sit on (the ball)," said Persin.

Oak Hill roared back, going on a 7-0 run of its own to open the second quarter. The teams then volleyed back-and-forth behind the sharpshooting of Kalida's Matt Warnecke and Oak Hill's Hale. The guards each sank a pair of three-pointers, forcing a 15-15 tie with 3:09 left in the half.

The Wildcats reeled off two straight buckets behind the strong inside play of Basinger to grab a 19-15 lead, but the Oaks' Jesse Slone rattled in a three-pointer in the final minute to pull his team to within one at 19-18 entering halftime.

Just like it did in the first, Kalida opened the second half with seven straight points. Basinger's solid play carried over, as the 6-foot-3 junior scored five of the seven Wildcats' points, even stepping out and drilling a three-pointer from the top of the arc.

Again the Oaks fought back on the strength of the three point shot. Borden nailed one to end the Kalida scoring run while Hale, just a sophomore, stroked his third of the contest to pull Oak Hill to within 26-24 entering the fourth quarter.

Oak Hill grabbed their first lead since the first quarter midway through

the fourth when J.D. Hale found a cutting Borden under the basket for a layup and 30-28 advantage. But Kalida's Scott Schnipke sank a jumper from the lane to knot the score. It was Schnipke's first basket of the game after scoring a game-high 24 in the semifinals.

Schnipke then hit a tough one-hander from the block, giving the Wildcats' a 32-30 lead with two minutes left. Warnecke split a pair of

free throws in the final minute to extend the lead to three, setting up the dramatic conclusion.

Borden and Western Hale were the high scorers for Oak Hill with 13 apiece. Ondera added seven points and 10 rebounds.

Kalida (23-5) got 19 points and five rebounds from Basinger. Schnipke chipped with nine points and seven boards.

Girls Division I - It may have been cold outside, but inside C.T. Branin Natatorium in Canton, Ohio, Upper Arlington High School was heating things up. The Golden Bears' 295 points proved too much for Columbus Bishop Watterson and Cincinnati Turpin, winning the 2010 Division I OHSAA Girls Swimming State Title, its sixth straight title.

Although Upper Arlington won only one event, the 200 medley relay, the Golden Bears had swimmers finish in the top eight in every event. Junior Abby Chin landed second on the podium in three different events, the 500 freestyle and 200 and 400 freestyle relays. Cincinnati Turpin sophomore Molly Hazelbaker managed to catch Chin in the last 25-meters to take the title in the 500 freestyle.

Also turning in a strong performance for Upper Arlington was sophomore Lauren Comer, who was a member of the state champion 200 medley relay team. Comer picked up second place finishes in the 200 individual medley and 400 freestyle relay and third place in the 100 backstroke.

Besting Upper Arlington in four of those events was Columbus Bishop Watterson, led by senior Gracie Finnegan. Finnegan picked up individual medals in the 50 freestyle and 100 freestyle for the third consecutive year and also swam the anchor leg in both the 200 and 400 freestyle champion teams. Finnegan finishes her prep career with eight state titles.

Dublin Scioto senior Kate McNeilis, who set a new pool record of 54.21 with her preliminary swim in the backstroke, was named the girls Swimmer of the Meet, winning both the 200 freestyle and the 100 backstroke.

Girls Division II - With 333 points and a state title at C.T. Branin Natatorium in Canton, Ohio, Gates Mills Hawken has now won 20 out of the last 26 girls Division II swimming titles. The Hawks are the only team to ever be crowned Division II champions, having won every year since a second division was added for the 1999-2000 school year.

Columbus Bishop Hartley turned in its best team finish ever, earning second place with 157 points. Napoleon and Sandusky Perkins tied for third with 149 points.

Senior Margo Geer of Milford Center Fairbanks leaves the Ohio high school state meet as the only swimmer, boy or girl, to ever win two different events four straight years. Her preliminary time of 48.63 in the 100 freestyle broke the state, state tournament and pool records she set last year. Likewise in the 50 freestyle, her time of 22.43 reset her own state tournament and pool records.

Her dominance in the sport is demonstrated by the fact that her times in both the 50 and 100 freestyle would have placed her in the top 20 swimmers in the boys Division II tournament.

Senior Samantha Zuch of Napoleon and junior Celia Oberholzer of Cincinnati Wyoming successfully defended their state titles. Zuch won the 200 freestyle with a time of 1:50.91 and won the 400 freestyle by a margin of nearly seven seconds. In the closest finish of the night, Oberholzer won in the 100 backstroke by just .01 seconds.

Although several Bombers turned in podium worthy performances, Miller seemed to find his way to the top half of the podium more than most. Miller finished first in the 500 freestyle, second in the 200 freestyle and 400 freestyle relay and third in the 200 freestyle relay.

Keeping Miller from the top step of the podium in two events were sophomore Dan DiSalle and junior Rowan Williams of Toledo St. Francis DeSales. The pair teamed up on both the 400 freestyle and 200 medley championship relay teams. In addition, each placed in the top eight in two other events.

2010 IN REVIEW

The 19th four-time state champion was crowned and the longest state championship streak in any sport in Ohio came to an end as the 2010 OHSAA state wrestling championships wrapped up at the Jerome Schottenstein Center in Columbus.

Monroeville senior Logan Stieber picked up his fourth state title when he pinned Casstown Miami East senior Zane Goldberg in the first period of the Div. III 125-pound bout. Stieber won titles at 103 pounds as a freshman, 119 pounds as a sophomore and 125 pounds as a junior.

After finishing second by one point a year ago, Monroeville claimed its first state wrestling title by winning the Div. III championship with 116 points. Five of the six Eagle state tournament qualifiers placed in the top

eight, while four of them won state titles. Joining Stieber at the top of the podium were his younger brother, Hunter, Cam Tessari and Chris Phillips, all finishing their junior season with their third state title. Cuyahoga Valley Christian Academy earned runner-up honors with 76 points.

The Division I race went back-and-forth all weekend between Wadsworth and Lakewood St. Edward, and the closest large school division race since 1977 ended with Wadsworth topping the Eagles 172 to 167.5. St. Edward had won the previous 13 state titles, the longest consecutive streak in any sport in Ohio.

Coach John Gramuglia, who was inducted into the Ohio High School Wrestling Coaches Association Hall of Fame earlier in the day, led 12 Wadsworth wrestlers to the state tournament, eight of whom had podium finishes and four of whom claimed state titles. It was the second state wrestling championship for the Grizzlies and first since 1942.

St. Paris Graham Local ran away with the Division II race by scoring 223 points en route to its 11th state wrestling title overall and ninth in a row. The Falcons qualified 11 wrestlers to the state tournament and eight to state final bouts, six of whom were crowned state champions. Senior Max Thomusseit (189 pounds) and sophomore Felipe Martinez (140 pounds) helped Graham's championship cause by winning their second state titles. Oak Harbor finished as the Division II runner-up with 78.5 points.

Three senior wrestlers finished their high school careers as three-time state champions including Jamie Clark of Lakewood St. Edward, Ty Mitch of Aurora and Harrison Hightower of Hunting Valley University School.

Mantua Crestwood senior Paige Nemecek became the first girl to qualify for the state tournament and continued her historic run by winning a match in the Div. II consolation round.

Attendance for the final session Saturday night was 14,886, a total of 64,617 attended the three-day event.
