## "Basketball All-Star Games" OHSAA General Sports Regulation 7.6

The concept of "All-Star" games developed many years ago. At the time, at the conclusion of the school basketball season, there were virtually no other formal/organized basketball events that took place. Along came "AAU" tournaments, 'Travel' Tournaments and everything in between. However, rules regarding participating in these "All-Star Games" did not change with the times. As a result many veteran coaches are still under the assumption that only seniors may participate in "All-Star Games" (no longer true) and that seniors may only play in 2 of these "All-Star Games" (no longer true). So, consider these facts:

- ANY organized basketball event outside the OHSAA's defined season of play is considered a "non-interscholastic event".
- Any player who participates in a Non-Interscholastic Event outside the season must adhere to the regulations addressing all noninterscholastic events for that sport. They include but are not limited to:
  - No more than 2 individuals that played for the same school teams the previous season may be on the same non-interscholastic team. In other words, if an All-Star game is held, no more than 2 individuals from the same school's 9-12 (or 7-8) team may be on the same All-Star team. Graduating seniors are and exception and do not have to adhere to this nor are they counted in the number (2) permitted.
  - 7-8 Coaches may not coach 7-8 players from their school in any All-Star game outside the season EXCEPT if it were held during June and July. They MAY coach players in grades 9-12 from their school in an All-Star game outside the season anytime except during the No-Contact Period.
  - 9-12 Coaches may not coach 9-12 players from their school in any All-Star game outside the season EXCEPT for graduating seniors and except if it were held during June and July. They MAY coach players in grades 7-8 from their school in an All-Start game outside the season anytime except during the No-Contact Period.
- There is no limit to the number of Non-Interscholastic events an individual may play in outside the OHSAA's defined season of play.
  Taking this one step further, there is no limit to the number of All-Star games a player at any level may play in outside the season of play.

## Additional Comment :

:

So, YES, you have read the above correctly. ANY player in grades 7-12 may play in an "All-Star" game because an "All-Star" game is nothing more than any other non-interscholastic event such as an "AAU" tournament/game. Further more, since the NCAA does not restrict how many of these games a player participates in, there is no reason the OHSAA would restrict that number. Provided players adhere to all of the non-interscholastic regulations governing them in the off-season, they may participate in them and coaches may coach in them.
