2010 Tournament Information and Notes

WHAT: 39th Annual OHSAA Football Tournaments (State Finals/ Fifth Round)

WHEN/WHERE: Friday, Dec. 3 Division IV (11 a.m. at Massillon), VI (3 p.m. at Canton) and II (7 p.m. at Massillon); Saturday, Dec. 4 Division V (11 a.m. at Canton), III (3 p.m. at Massillon) and I (7 p.m. at Canton).

FORMAT: Thirty-two teams in six divisions (192 total schools) qualified for the tournaments, with selections based on the OHSAA Football Computer Rankings. To qualify for the tournaments, schools must have finished first through eighth in their assigned region.

FOOTBALL STATS: Media members around the state are encouraged to submit their area statistical leaders from the regular-season to the OHSAA in order to compile a statewide statistical leader board. Media may submit their area leaders in any format to the OHSAA by email at tstried@ohsaa.org or by fax at 614-267-1677. The list is now posted on the football page at ohsaa.org.

FIRST TIME STATE CHAMPIONS: Lakewood St. Edward (Div. I) and Maple Heights (Div. II) both claimed their first football state championships over the weekend. St. Edward's does so in its fourth-trip to the title game, while Maple Heights did so in its second.

THREE-PEAT: Youngstown Ursuline becomes the sixth school in OHSAA history to win three consecutive titles. The Irish join Cincinnati Moeller, Cleveland St. Ignatius, Delphos St. John's, Newark Catholic, and Versailles in accomplishing the feat.

BLUE JAYS SET OHSAA CHAMPIONSHIP RECORDS: Delphos St. John's scored 11 offensive touchdowns, which set an OHSAA record for most touchdowns in a championship game in all divisions. The Blue Jays also set records for most points in an OHSAA playoff and championship game (77) and largest margin of victory in a championship game for all divisions (71-points).

2010 DIVISION I STATE CHAMPIONSHIP

December 4, 2010 (at Canton Fawcett Stadium)

Huber Heights Wayne 7 0 14 7--- 28 Record: (11-4)

Lakewood St. Edward 7 0 14 14--- 35 Record: (15-0)

Coaches: Ray Finotti (Lakewood St. Edward); Jay Minton (Huber Heights Wayne)

In a hard fought OHSAA Division I state championship game, third-ranked Lakewood St. Edward outlasted unranked Huber Heights Wayne 35-28 to win its first state title Saturday at Canton Fawcett Stadium.

St. Edward overcame a 14-point second-half deficit to win, tying the record for largest comeback to win in a Division I championship game. The state championship is the Eagles first in football, as they had previously been to the championship game three other times. They finish the season 15-0.

The Eagles started the scoring with a meticulous 8:32 drive to start the first quarter, capped off by senior running back Reggie Terrell punching it in for a one-yard touchdown. Wayne answered later in the quarter when senior quarterback Braxton Miller, the Division I Offensive Player of the Year, slashed his way to the end zone for a 17-yard rushing touchdown.

The score remained tied 7-7 through a back-and-forth second quarter.

The third quarter began with a bang, with Miller connecting twice for touchdown passes to put Wayne up 21-7. The first went to senior receiver Seth Stuart, the second to junior receiver Marshall Peterson.

St. Edward responded with 21 unanswered points. Eagles senior receiver Patrick Barry collected a 10-yard touchdown reception from senior quarterback Kevin Burke, followed by an immediate interception of Miller by senior linebacker Avery Bailey. Senior running back Terrell Bates tied the game at 21, on a 15-yard touchdown run less than a minute after the turnover. Burke added one more touchdown, diving into the end zone to cap off a six-yard run. The extra-point attempt failed after a penalty moved the kick back 10 yards.

Wayne countered, relying on Miller one more time, scoring from two yards out to take the lead 28-27 in the fourth quarter.

St. Edward, determined to persevere, took the ball 60 yards on seven plays, scoring with 1:32 left in the game. Bates provided the game-winning score on a 17-yard run from scrimmage. The Eagles converted a two-point conversion to go up by seven when Burke connected with junior receiver Quincy Jones in the back corner of the end zone.

Wayne had one more opportunity to tie the game, but was thwarted when Miller was intercepted on fourth down by St. Edward senior defensive back Cory Blackstock to ultimately seal the victory.

Miller led the Warriors offensively completing 15 of 24 passes for 200 yards and two touchdowns. He also ran the ball 15 times for 64 yards and two touchdowns.

For St. Edward, Burke completed nine of 13 passes for 89 yards and a touchdown. In addition, he ran for a team-high 130 yards and a touchdown. Bates ran 21 times for 92 yards and two touchdowns.

Wayne now has two state championship game appearances, finishing as the runner-up in both. The Warriors finish the season 11-4.

2010 DIVISION II STATE CHAMPIONSHIP

Maple Heights got off to a slow start out of the gate, but quickly found its groove as the Mustangs overcame a 19-point deficit and accelerated past Trotwood-Madison for a 45-33 victory Friday at Massillon Paul Brown Stadium in the OHSAA Division II football state championship game.

Maple Heights senior quarterback Shaq Washington, who accounted for seven touchdowns in the game, scampered 19 yards into the end zone with 46 seconds left in the fourth quarter to seal the game for the Mustangs.

The end zone was a familiar spot for Washington, as the dynamic quarterback reached pay dirt on the ground four times in the game. He finished the game with 29 carries for 174 yards. The four touchdowns tied the Division II record for rushing touchdowns and most touchdowns for an individual in the state finals. Washington also completed 11 of 19 passes for 216 yards and three touchdowns.

The primary receiving target for the Mustangs was senior receiver Andre Stubbs, whose seven catches for 170 yards and two touchdowns set an individual record for most receiving yards in a Division II state championship game. Stubbs' 80-yard touchdown reception in the second quarter set a new record for longest scoring pass play in the Division II state championship game.

Trailing 26-7 in the first half, Maple Heights was able to muster together several long scoring drives to catch up and eventually zoom past Trotwood-Madison. In the process, the Mustangs set a new record for largest deficit overcome to win a championship in Division II.

Trotwood-Madison took an early 13-0 lead before Maple Heights could successfully run a play from scrimmage. The Rams offense was paced by senior running back Antwan Gilbert, who rushed 28 times for 179 yards. He also scored on an electrifying 45-yard punt return to start the second quarter.

The Rams were able to hold onto their lead until 9:41 remained in the fourth quarter, when Maple Heights took a 37-33 lead on a two-yard run by Washington.

Both teams lit up the scoreboard all night, scoring a combined total of 78 points to set a new Division II record for most combined points in a state championship game.

The win capped off a perfect 15-0 season for the fourth-ranked Mustangs. It was Maple Heights' first state championship in school history.

Unranked Trotwood-Madison finishes the season with a 12-3 record and its second runner-up finish in school history.

2010 DIVISION III STATE CHAMPIONSHIP

Despite committing six turnovers, third-ranked Columbus Bishop Watterson prevailed over unranked Akron Buchtel, 13-12, to win the OHSAA Division III football state championship Saturday at Massillon Paul Brown Tiger Stadium.

Buchtel had two opportunities to retake the lead during the last four minutes of the game, but were turned away both times by a stingy Bishop Watterson defense that truly guided the Eagles to the win. Senior linebacker Matt Redfield recorded a team-high eight tackles, and junior linebacker Craig Fada pitched in with six tackles and a sack.

A game that was a defensive struggle, consumed by turnovers and empty possessions by both teams, turned into a nail-biter late in the game as the two sides swapped leads in the fourth quarter.

Bishop Watterson took a 6-0 lead with 2:55 remaining in the first quarter on a one-yard run by senior quarterback Patrick Rhomberg.

Neither offense was able to put together a scoring drive for the remainder of the first half, but Buchtel's opportunistic defense took advantage of an errant Bishop Watterson pass, as junior defensive back Jarrod Wilson returned an interception 82 yards for a score as time expired in the first half.

The play set a new Division III state championship game record for longest interception return for a touchdown. It also marked Wilson's fourth consecutive game with a defensive touchdown, and the 14th time the Griffins' defense put points on the board this season.

Buchtel took its first lead of the game late in the third quarter, as senior quarterback Steve Parker connected with senior Tyler Jones for an eight-yard touchdown reception. The Griffins were not able to hold the lead, as Bishop Watterson's game-clinching score came on a three-yard rushing touchdown by senior running back Ray Cook with 10:50 left in the fourth quarter.

Bishop Watterson senior defensive back Brad Mccurdy sealed the victory with an interception with two minutes left in regulation.

The win gave Bishop Watterson a final record of 13-1 and earned the Eagles their second state championship in school history.

Two-time state champion Buchtel finished as runner-up for the third time and completed its season at 11-4.

2010 DIVISION IV STATE CHAMPIONSHIP

Columbus Bishop Hartley took control of the game early and remained in the driver's seat for its entirety, as the Hawks defeated Chagrin Falls 34-13 to claim the Division IV state football championship Friday at Massillon Paul Brown Tiger Stadium.

Bishop Hartley scored on its first three possessions of the game, with the offensive onslaught beginning on the Hawks' first play from scrimmage when senior running back Omar Lane scampered 52 yards for a touchdown. Four minutes later, Hawks senior quarterback Austin Underwood connected with receiver sophomore Jawuan Woodley on a 43-yard touchdown pass. Senior running back Noah Key, the Division IV co-offensive player of the year, capped off the first half scoring for Bishop Hartley, as he was able to take a carry to the outside and streak 60 yards up the sideline for a touchdown.

In the second quarter, Chagrin Falls scored on an 11-yard screen pass from sophomore quarterback Tommy Iammarino to sophomore running back Bradley Munday to cut the deficit to 20-7 at halftime.

Chagrin Falls scored late in the third quarter, as sophomore running back Kurt Vidmer scored on a two-yard run to pull the Tigers within a touchdown at 20-13.

Bishop Hartley quickly responded, as Underwood hit sophomore receiver Jacob Matuska with a 10-yard toss in the back of the end zone. The Hawks then put the game away for good, as Noah Key recovered a successful onside kick immediately following the score. Minutes later, Key rushed for a 17-yard touchdown, giving Bishop Hartley its 34-13 lead.

Bishop Hartley outgained Chagrin Falls offensively, with 378 yards of total offense compared to the Tigers' 159 yards. Most of the damage was done on the ground, as the Hawks finished with 299 rushing yards.

Noah Key led the way for Bishop Hartley, rushing 24 times for 130 yards and two touchdowns. In addition to his offensive production and recovered onside kick, he also added an interception on the defensive side of the ball. Lane carried the ball six times for 117 yards and one touchdown.

Chagrin Falls, unranked at the end of the regular-season, finished as the state runner-up for the second year in a row, losing to Kettering Archbishop Alter in the 2009 championship game. The Tigers finished the season at 13-2.

The win capped off a 13-2 season for Bishop Hartley, which was also unranked, and gave the Hawks their second football state championship in school history. Bishop Hartley won its first state title in 1986.

2010 DIVISION V STATE CHAMPIONSHIP

December 4, 2009 (at Canton Fawcett Stadium)

Youngstown Ursuline 15 29 7 0--- 51 Record: (15-0)

In a rematch of last year's championship game, top-ranked Youngstown Ursuline claimed its third-straight OHSAA Division V football state championship Saturday, defeating unranked Coldwater 51-21 at Canton Fawcett Stadium.

The two schools combined for a Division V championship game record 10 touchdowns, which is second only to Delphos St. John's and Shadyside, which scored 11 between them the night before in the Division VI championship.

Ursuline (15-0) becomes the sixth school in OHSAA history to win three consecutive football state championships. The title was the Irish's fourth in school history, their first coming in 2000.

Ursuline displayed a high-powered offense all game, setting multiple championship game records. The Irish posted the Division V record for most points in a quarter, tallying 29 in the second. In addition, Ursuline surpassed its own record-setting output of 508 yards of offense in 2009, registering 611 yards of total offense.

Ursuline senior quarterback Paul Kempe becomes only the second quarterback in OHSAA history to ever lead his team to three consecutive state championships, the other being Jason Turner, who led Versailles to titles in 1993, '94, and '95. Kempe finished the game six-for-nine passing for a 119 yards, throwing for one touchdown and running for another.

Coldwater persisted all afternoon, refusing to relent after falling behind early. Senior receiver Ross Klenke collected seven catches for 125 yards and three touchdowns to lead the way for the Cavaliers. Klenke's three touchdown grabs sets the mark for most receiving touchdowns by an individual in the Division V championship game.

Akise Teague, Ohio's 2010 Mr. Football, led the Ursuline offense, setting the record for most touchdowns in a Division V championship game and tying the record for all divisions, scoring five times. Teague tied the previous record (four) in the first half and went on to finish the day with 19 carries for 249 yards and four receptions for 94 yards.

Coldwater, which owns two state titles, becomes state runner-up for the fourth-time in school history and second year in a row. The Cavaliers finish the season with a 12-3 record.

2010 DIVISION VI STATE CHAMPIONSHIP

Coaches: Todd Schulte (Delphos St. John's); Mark Holenka (Shadyside)

Top-ranked Delphos St. John's imposed itself early and never looked back, defeating 10th-ranked Shadyside 77-6 in the OHSAA Division VI football state championship game Friday at Canton Fawcett Stadium.

St. John's scored 11 offensive touchdowns, which sets an OHSAA record for most touchdowns in a championship game in all divisions. The Blue Jays also set records for most points in an OHSAA playoff and championship game (77) and largest margin of victory in a championship game for all divisions (71-points). In addition, St. John's set a Division VI championship game record rushing for 416 yards as a team. This mark is fourth overall in all divisions. St. John's 552 yards of total offense is third overall for all divisions in championship games.

Defensively, St. John's forced Shadyside into turning the ball over seven times. Six of those seven turnovers were interceptions, with Ty Bergfeld recording three of his own.

The Blue Jays were led offensively by senior running back Evan Burgei, who ran 17 times for 123 yards and three touchdowns, also collecting one receiving touchdown. Blue Jays senior quarterback Jordan Leininger threw two touchdown passes in addition to rushing 13 times for 101 yards and two touchdowns. Senior running back Ty Bergfeld caught two passes for 49 yards and a touchdown. Other Blue Jay touchdowns were scored by juniors Jordan Bergfeld and Chris Will along with sophomores Mark Bogg and Brock Bonifas.

Determined not to be shut-out, Shadyside scored on a 13-yard rushing touchdown in the fourth-quarter by senior running back Evan Marling, but failed to convert the extra-point.

Individual state championship records for St. John's were set by Evan Burgei, who recorded a Division VI championship game record for most touchdowns with four, and tied the mark for most rushing touchdowns (3). Running back Chris Will set the mark for longest run for a touchdown in the Division VI championship game with his 75-yard dash in the fourth quarter.

St. John's claimed its sixth state championship overall and second in the last three years. The Blue Jays are now the fourth school with six OHSAA football titles. St. John's finishes their season 15-0.

Shadyside becomes the state runner-up for the second time in school history, finishing with a record of 13-2.

2010 State Tournament Information and Notes

WHICH SEEDS REMAIN: Of the 12 teams that earned a berth in state championship games, there are four one seeds, one two seed, two three seeds, two four seeds, two five seeds and an eight seed. The Div. VI matchup between Shadyside and Delphos St. John's is the only game between two top seeds.

CINDERELLA STORY: Huber Heights Wayne lost its first two games of the regular season and got into the Div. I tournament as an eight seed with three losses. The Warriors have become the sixth team with an eight seed to advance to a state title game since the playoffs expanded to eight teams per region in 1999. The only eight seed to win a state championship was St. Henry in 2004.

MAN VS. COMPUTER: Every team ranked in the Top-10 of the final Associated Press statewide polls qualified for the tournaments. There are six ranked teams playing for state titles this weekend. Youngstown Ursuline (Div. V) and Delphos St. John's (Div. VI) are the only two state poll champions still alive. There is only one matchup of ranked teams (Div. VI), while the Div. IV championship features two unranked teams. See page 10 for the AP polls.

DEFENDING STATE CHAMPIONS: Five of the six state champions from 2009 returned to the playoffs to defend their state titles this year. Youngstown Ursuline (Div. V) is the only team still alive that can defend its state championship. Hilliard Davidson (Div. I) and Kettering Archbishop Alter (Div. IV) fell in the state semifinal round. Other defending champions Cincinnati Winton Woods (Div. II) lost in the regional semifinals and Youngstown Cardinal Mooney (Div. III) lost in the regional finals. Norwalk St. Paul (Div. VI) finished the season 7-3 and ninth in Region 21 and failed to qualify for the playoffs.

TAKE TWO: Oddly enough, four of the six state championship games feature 2009 state runner-up teams. Maple Heights (Div. II), Chagrin Falls (Div. IV), Coldwater (Div. V) and Delphos St. John's (Div. VI) all have a chance this year to claim the title after losing in the final a year ago. Coldwater gets a chance to do it against the team it lost to in 2009 when the Cavaliers face Youngstown Ursuline.

MAC ATTACK: Speaking of Coldwater and Delphos St. John's, the two Midwest Athletic Conference (MAC) schools continue the conference's streak of having a team play in a state championship game every year since 2003. MAC teams have won nine state championships in those eight years (Delphos St. John's 2, Maria Stein Marion Local 2, Coldwater 2, St. Henry 2, Versailles 1). Of the Top-10 schools in state football tournament winning percentage, there are five MAC schools (see page 9).

NOTING THE UNDEFEATED: Thirty-seven schools completed undefeated regular seasons, all of which made the playoffs. The 37 schools marks the most undefeated teams in a season since the playoffs expanded in 1999. There are only four undefeated teams remaining: Lakewood St. Edward (Div. I), Maple Heights (Div. II), Youngstown Ursuline (Div. V) and Delphos St. John's (Div. VI).

MOST TOURNAMENT WINS: There are now 21 schools that have at least 30 OHSAA tournament victories. Kettering Archbishop Alter collected its 30th tournament victory with its regional final win over Kenton. Alter joins Youngstown Ursuline and Cincinnati St. Xavier in achieving the 30-win mark during the 2010 tournament. Newark Catholic leads the state with 62 playoff wins. Rounding out the top five are Cle. St. Ignatius (55), Youngstown Cardinal Mooney (51), Col. St. Francis DeSales (47) and Steubenville and Versailles tied at 45. A win in the state championship game for Akron Buchtel would make the Griffins the 22nd team on the list.

ANNUAL CONTENDERS: There are 11 schools that have at least 20 appearances in the OHSAA football tournaments. Div. I: Cleveland St. Ignatius (22) and Cincinnati Archbishop Moeller (29). Div. III: Youngstown Cardinal Mooney (24), Columbus St. Francis DeSales (21), Columbus Bishop Watterson (21) and Steubenville (23). Div. IV: Orrville (21) and Ironton (28). Div. V: Wheelersburg (23). Div. VI: Mogadore (24) and Newark Catholic (31). All 11 schools, with the exception of Cleveland St. Ignatius, made the playoffs in 2010.

Columbus St. Francis DeSales now has the longest consecutive playoff streak as the Stallions are back in for the 17th straight season. Cleveland St. Ignatius failed to qualify for the first time since 1987, ending its state-leading streak of 22-straight playoff appearances.

FIRST-TIME PARTICIPANTS MAKE QUICK EXITS: Six schools made their first appearances in the OHSAA football playoffs and all six fell in the first round. Columbus Northland (Division I, Region 3), Cleveland John F. Kennedy (Division II, Region 6), Cincinnati Taft (Division IV, Region 16), Hanoverton United (Division V, Region 17), Lancaster Fairfield Christian Academy (Division VI, Region 23) and Salineville Southern (Division VI, Region 23) made their playoff debuts in 2010.

The number of first-time participants since 2000 by year include six in 2010, 14 in 2009, 12 in 2008, 14 in 2007, 10 in 2006, 12 in 2005, 16 in 2004, 12 in 2003, 21 in 2002, 17 in 2001 and 26 in 2000.

There are now 104 member schools playing football which have never qualified for the state tournament.

TWELFTH YEAR WITH 192 QUALIFIERS: This is the 12th year that the OHSAA football tournament field consists of 192 total qualifiers. Each of the 24 regions qualified eight teams to the tournaments, which consist of five rounds. The first round is the regional quarterfinals, and teams that finish first through fourth in their regions in the final OHSAA computer rankings serve as hosts. Teams may choose an alternate site to host first-round games and do not need approval from the OHSAA to do so. In bracket order, team one hosts team eight, team four hosts team five, team two hosts team seven and team three hosts team six. The OHSAA designates neutral sites for regional semifinal, regional final and state semifinal games, and no rebracketing will occur until the state semifinals.

FOOTBALL SCHOOLS: There were 715 football-playing schools this year. The division breakdowns are:

- Division I: 119 schools (enrollments of 518 or more);
- Division II: 116 schools (enrollments of 348 through 517);
- Division III: 119 schools (enrollments of 252 through 347);
- Division IV: 119 schools (enrollments of 177 through 251);
- Division V: 120 schools (enrollments of 125 through 176);
- Division VI: 122 schools (enrollments of 124 or less).

Divisions are based on enrollments of males in grades 9 through 11 as reported to the State Department of Education in October 2008.

TOURNAMENT ATTENDANCE: Total attendance for the OHSAA football tournaments has been nearly 6.5 million in the last 10 years. In 2009 the total tournament attendance (186 games) was 561,416 for an average of 3,018 per game. The state finals (six games) attendance total was 39,027 for an average of 6,504 per game.

The state football finals are Dec. 3 and 4 at Fawcett Stadium in Canton and Paul Brown Tiger Stadium in Massillon. Tickets can be ordered on-line at www.ohsaafinals.com. Ticket books are \$48.00 for the six games. Also available are prepaid two-day parking passes for \$10.00, prepaid two-day motor home parking passes for \$20.00 and state tournament souvenir programs for \$4.00 (a savings of \$1.00 from the price at the games). Priority seating will be assigned on a first-come, first-served basis. There will be a \$3.00 ticket processing fee per order and a \$2.00 postage fee per order. An undefeated team takes on an unlikely foe in the Div. I state championship game, when third-ranked Lakewood St. Edward faces unranked Huber Heights Wayne. After losing its first two games of the season, Wayne has stormed to the state title game as an eight seed out of Region 4, only the sixth eighth seed to reach a state final since the tournament expanded to eight teams per region in 1999. The only eight seed to go on to win the state championship was St. Henry in 2004.

Wayne rushed out to a 21-point halftime lead against Hilliard Davidson in the state semifinal en route to the Warriors' 28-14 defeat of the defending state champions. Senior RB Anthonie Taylor rushed for 182 yards and a score, while senior QB Braxton Miller threw for two touchdowns and ran for another. Taylor has gained 1,533 yards on the season, while Miller has thrown for just shy of 2,000 yards and 15 touchdowns on the year. This will mark the Warriors second state final appearance, after finishing as runner-up in 1999.

After finishing 4-6 and missing the playoffs in 2009, Lakewood St. Edward will get its fourth crack at a state championship, after finishing as runner-up in its three previous appearances. The Eagles are powerful on both sides of the ball, averaging 38 points a game and only giving up 11 a contest. Senior QB Kevin Burke, a 1,000 yard rusher and a 1,500 yard passer, and senior RBs Reggie Terrell and Terrell Bates star behind a big offensive line.

After falling to Cincinnati Winton Woods a year ago in the state championship, No. 4 Maple Heights has stormed back into the Div. II state title game to face unranked Trotwood-Madison. Maple Heights brings an undefeated record into the contest, scoring 42 points a game with an average margin of victory of 30. The 592 points the Mustangs have racked up in 2010 puts them at 18th all-time in Ohio high school history.

As it did a year ago, Maple Heights downed Mentor Lake Catholic in the state semifinal, this time by a 27-17 score. The Mustangs were led by senior QB Shaq Washington, who gained 127 of his 151 rushing yards in the second half. Washington threw for another 154 yards and two scores, while also rushing for two touchdowns. Seniors DeVonte Ransom, who has rushed for 1,914 yards and 23 scores on the season, Andre Stubbs and Dana Day also lead the Mustangs' prolific offense.

Trotwood-Madison enters the state championship game for the second time in school history and first since 1981, a squad that finished as state runner-up and included current head coach Maurice Douglass. The tournament trail for Trotwood has seen the Rams knock out defending state champion Cincinnati Winton Woods in the regional semifinals and erase a 20-point halftime deficit to score the go-ahead touchdown with five seconds remaining in the state semifinal against Uniontown Lake. Senior RB Antwan Gilbert, who has rushed for 2,113 yards and 25 touchdowns on the year, has been nearly unstoppable in the postseason, scoring 13 times and averaging nearly nine yards per carry in the playoffs.

Two teams making their fifth state championship appearance square off in Div. III when unranked Akron Buchtel faces No. 3 Columbus Bishop Watterson. After facing a tough regular-season schedule with only one Div. III team, Akron Buchtel seems to be peaking at the right time. The Griffins knocked out defending state champion Youngstown Cardinal Mooney 35-10 in the regional final, before racing past top-ranked Alliance Marlington 52-8 in the state semifinal. Buchtel outgained Marlington 425 yards to 157 yards behind the legs of QB Steve Parker and his connection with WR Corey Smith. Parker ran for 129 yards and threw for 205 yards and three scores. Smith caught five balls for 170 yards and two touchdowns giving the senior 45 catches, 1,057 yards and 15 touchdowns on the season.

Columbus Bishop Watterson reaches the state championship game behind stout defensive efforts in the postseason. The Eagles have allowed seven points in each of their four tournament games and have only allowed eight points per game the entire season. A new state champion will be crowned in Div. IV as unranked Columbus Bishop Hartley took down two-time defending state champion Kettering Archbishop Alter in the state semifinals to face another unranked team in Chagrin Falls in the state title game. Bishop Hartley was an extra point away from tying the score against Alter with two minutes remaining, but instead elected to go for the two-point conversion and converted, giving the Hawks the 29-28 victory and their third state title appearance in school history. Bishop Hartley won the state championship in 1986 and was runner-up in 1984.

Bishop Hartley's almost exclusive running attack is led by senior RB Noah Key, who rushed for 1,810 yards and 26 touchdowns in the regular season. Key has continued to put up big numbers in the playoffs, running for 274, 242, 179 and 239 yards in the Hawks' four tournament games. He has found the end zone 37 times this season via the rush, a school record and 12th all-time in Ohio high school history.

Chagrin Falls used a stout defense in the state semifinals against Orrville to reach the state championship game for the second consecutive year. In their 21-3 victory, the Tigers allowed only 121 yards, forced five turnovers and collected three sacks against the Red Riders. Chagrin Falls, in search of its first state title, reached the state final last year before falling to Archbishop Alter. Despite its repeat appearance, the Tigers feature several new faces, having graduated 22 seniors from a year ago and having overcome several key injuries, including one to senior all-purpose standout Marc Geraci. Senior QB Timmy Porter leads a balanced offense attack with several contributors including sophomores Bradley Munday and Jack Campbell and seniors Spencer Diedrich and Jack Hinman.

The Div. V state championship game will be a rematch of the 2009 and 2000 state title tilts, when No. 1 Youngstown Ursuline faces unranked Coldwater. Ursuline has dominated opponents in 2010, winning with an average margin of victory of nearly 28 points. The rushing attack for the Irish is led by RB Akise Teague, who ran for 269 and five scores in their state semifinal victory over Lima Central Catholic, and RB Tramain Thigpen, who also pitched in two scores. This marks the fifth state final appearance for Ursuline and its fourth consecutive. The Irish will try to join Cleveland St. Ignatius, Newark Catholic, Cincinnati Archbishop Moeller and Versailles as the only programs in history to win three consecutive state championships.

After losing two of its first three regular-season games, Coldwater has reached the state championship for the sixth time, hoping to claim its third state title.
