## 2011 OHSAA Football State Tournament Information & Notes



**WHAT:** 40th Annual OHSAA Football Championships (State Finals/ Fifth Round)

**WHEN/WHERE:** Friday, Dec. 2 Divisions II, III and V; Saturday, Dec. 3 Divisions I, IV and VI; Canton Fawcett Stadium and Massillon Paul Brown Tiger Stadium

**TIMES:** Games begin at 11:00 a.m., 3:00 p.m. and 7:00 p.m. both days.

**ADMISSION:** \$8.00 per person presale; \$10.00 per person at the gate.

**FORMAT:** Thirty-two teams in six divisions (192 total schools) qualified for the tournaments, with selections based on the OHSAA Football Computer Rankings. To qualify for the tournaments, schools must have finished first through eighth in their assigned region.

**FINAL COMPUTER RATINGS:** The final computer ratings were posted on the football page at www.ohsaa.org Sunday morning, October 30, 2011. This release contains the regional quarterfinals pairings. The final computer ratings and regional quarterfinal were also loaded to the AP Marketplace for AP members.

**THIRTEENTH YEAR WITH 192 QUALIFIERS:** This is the 13th year that the OHSAA football tournament field consists of 192 total qualifiers. Each of the 24 regions qualify eight teams to the tournaments, which consist of five rounds.

**FOOTBALL SCHOOLS:** There were 717 football-playing schools this year. The division breakdowns are:

- Division I: 118 schools (enrollments of 494 or more);
- Division II: 119 schools (enrollments of 327 through 493);
- Division III: 120 schools (enrollments of 243 through 326);
- Division IV: 122 schools (enrollments of 172 through 242);
- Division V: 116 schools (enrollments of 120 through 171);
- Division VI: 122 schools (enrollments of 119 or less).

Divisions are based on enrollments of males in grades 9 through 11 as reported to the State Department of Education in October 2010.

**STATE FINALS ATTENDANCE:** The six 2011 state championship games drew 48,695 spectators to Canton Fawcett Stadium and Massillon Paul Brown Tiger Stadium. That number is up almost 13,000 from the 2010 championships. The 2011 championship games averaged 8,116 fans compared to 5,956 just a year ago.

The 2011 attendance figure is the largest since 2007 when 50,972 spectators visited Stark County for the games. Attendance for the entire 2011 playoffs is unavailable at this time. See page 11 of the release for past playoff and championship attendance figures.

**HOW THE SEEDS FARED:** Three No. 1 seeds went on to win a state title (Trotwood-Madison, Kirtland and Maria Stein Marion Local). One two-seed (Clev. St. Ignatius), one three-seed (Creston Norwayne) and one four-seed (Youngstown Cardinal Mooney) claimed titles as well.

Of the 12 state finalist teams there were six one-seeds, three two-seeds, one three-seed, one four-seed and one five-seed. No six-seeds, seven-seeds or eight seeds advanced to the finals.

The Division II championship is the only game that featured one-seeds facing each other.

**FIRST TIME CHAMPIONS:** Three schools claimed their first football title in 2011. Trotwood-Madison claimed its first football championship in its third trip to the title game. The Rams were runners-up in 2010. Kirtland and Creston Norwayne also claimed their school's first titles in their first trip to the championship game.

**ALL-TIME TEAM CHAMPIONSHIPS:** There are nine schools with four or more OHSAA football championships. Cleveland St. Ignatius tops the list with 11, adding to its total in 2011. Youngstown Cardinal Mooney moved into a tie for second after claiming its eighth championship in 2011. The Cardinals are tied with Newark Catholic (8). Cincinnati Archbishop Moeller has seven titles, while Cleveland Benedictine, St. Henry, Versailles and Delphos St. John's all have six titles. Maria Stein Marion Local moved up the list adding its fifth title in 2011. Rounding out the top nine are Akron St. Vincent-St. Mary and Youngstown Ursuline with four titles each.

Ninety additional schools have won at least one or more state football championships. About 14-percent of all football-playing schools in Ohio have won a state championship.

**MOST TOURNAMENT WINS:** Entering the 2011 playoffs there were 21 schools that had at least 30 OHSAA tournament victories. Newark Catholic leads the state with 63 playoff wins (corrected). Rounding out the top eight are Cleveland St. Ignatius (61), Youngstown Cardinal Mooney (56), Columbus St. Francis DeSales (47), Delphos St. John's (47, previously omitted), Mogadore (46), Steubenville (46) and Coldwater (45).

**CHAMPIONSHIP WINNING PERCENTAGES:** 2011 champion Cleveland St. Ignatius (.836), Maria Stein Marion Local (.827) and Youngstown Cardinal Mooney (.767) all rank in the top-five winning percentages in playoff history. See page three for complete top-10 playoff winning percentages with teams that have played in 50 or more playoff games.

**NOTING THE UNDEFEATED:** Only two teams in the state finished 2011 undefeated. Division II champion Trotwood-Madison went 15-0, defeating Avon 42-28 for the state title, while Division V champion Kirtland finished a perfect 15-0, defeating Coldwater 28-7. It was both schools first state championship in football.

The 2011 regular season ended with 36 unbeaten teams after 10 weeks. Five undefeated teams came out of Region 12 in Division III. One undefeated team finished sixth in its region, Ashland Crestview (Region 19), one finished seventh, Jackson (Region 12) and one finished eighth, Oberlin Firelands (Region 9). The last undefeated team to miss the playoffs was Newcomerstown in 2001.

After round one, 23 undefeated teams advanced. Round two featured three games of undefeated teams matching up.

Fifteen of the 23 undefeated teams from round two advanced to play in a regional final. There were four matchups of undefeated teams in round three.

Ten of the remaining 15 undefeated teams moved on to the state semifinals. Two state semifinal games pitted undefeated's against each other.

Of the 10 undefeated teams that played in the state semifinals, four advanced on to a championship game. No undefeated teams squared off in a championship game.

**QUICK LOOK AT THE POLLS:** The Associated Press released its final rankings for each division after the final week of the regular season.

Five of the eventual six state champions were ranked in the top 10 at the end of the regular season.

The lowest ranked team to win was Youngstown Cardinal Mooney (#10, Div. III), followed by Cleveland St. Ignatius (#6, Div. I), Maria Stein Marion Local (#4, Div. VI), Kirtland (#2, Div. V) and Trotwood-Madison (#1, Div. II).

Creston Norwayne was the only unranked team to win a state championship, knocking off No. 1 Kenton in the Division IV championship.

Nine of the final 12 teams in the state were ranked the final poll. Only two of the six divisions' No. 1 ranked teams made it to a state title game. See page nine of this release for the full AP rankings.

**RETURN OF THE MAC:** Coldwater and Maria Stein Marion Local, two Midwest Athletic Conference (MAC) schools, continued the conference's streak of having at least one team play in a state championship game every year since 2003. MAC teams have gone on to win 11 state championships in those nine years (Delphos St. John's 3, Maria Stein Marion Local 3, Coldwater 2, St. Henry 2, Versailles 1).

Maria Stein Marion Local defeated New Washington Buckeye Central 61-21 in the Division VI championship game. Coldwater was defeated by Kirtland 28-7 in the Division IV title game.

**QUITE THE ACCOMPLISHMENT:** After playing for the 2011 Division V championship Coldwater has played in the title game six times in the past eleven years.

The Cavaliers were defeated, 28-7, by Kirtland becoming the first school to finish as runner-up three years in a row. Coldwater finished as runner-up to Youngstown Ursuline in 2009 and 2010. The Cavaliers also finished as runners- up in 1998 and 2000. Coldwater has two championships coming in 2005 and 2007.

**ANNUAL CONTENDERS:** Columbus St. Francis DeSales holds the longest active streak of consecutive years making the playoffs. The Stallions made their 18th straight appearance this year after finishing first in Region 10 with a 6-3 record. The longest streak of consecutive years making the playoffs ever is 22 years by Cleveland St. Ignatius. The streak started in 1988 and was broken in 2010 when the Wildcats failed to qualify for the playoffs.

There are 11 schools that have at least 20 appearances in the OHSAA football tournaments. Div. I: Cincinnati Archbishop Moeller (30), Cleveland St. Ignatius (23)

and Canton McKinley (20). Div. III: Youngstown Cardinal Mooney (25), Steubenville (24) and Columbus St. Francis DeSales (22). Div. IV: Newark Catholic (31, previously omitted) Ironton (29) and Orrville (22). Div. V: Wheelersburg (23). Div. VI: Mogadore (25).

**CONSECUTIVE STATE TITLES:** Cleveland St. Ignatius holds the mark for most consecutive state championships with five. The Wildcats won the state title from 1991-1995. Newark Catholic won four titles in a row from 1984-1987. Four other schools have won three consecutive titles; Cincinnati Archbishop Moeller (1975-77), Delphos St. John's (1997-99), Versailles (1993-95) and Youngstown Ursuline (2008-10).

**RECORD SCORING:** In its Division V first round game, Marion Pleasant defeated Cincinnati Summit Country Day 79-7. The 79 points the Spartans scored is an OHSAA playoff record for all divisions. The previous mark was set by Delphos St. John's in the 2010 Division VI championship game, when the Blue Jays defeated Shadyside 77-6. The Spartans lost in their regional semifinal game, 49-42, to West Jefferson.

**NINE SCHOOLS PICK UP FIRST PLAYOFF WIN:** In addition to the eight schools that made their first playoff appearances, there were a total of 34 schools in the 192-school playoff field looking for their first victory in the playoffs. Nine of those schools searching for their first OHSAA playoff victory advanced to the regional semifinals and claimed that first playoff win. Those schools are Ashland Crestview, Dayton Thurgood Marshall, East Cleveland Shaw, Kent Roosevelt, Minerva, Ravenna, Sugarcreek Garaway, Youngstown Christian and Zanesville Bishop Rosecrans.

None of the nine schools that collected their first playoff win in round one advanced out of round two to the regional finals.

**WELCOME TO THE POSTSEASON:** Eight schools made their first appearances in the OHSAA football playoffs. Div. I: Cleveland Heights (Region 1), Westerville Central (Region 3), and Cincinnati Walnut Hills (Region 4). Div. III: Oberlin Firelands (Region 9) and Dayton Thurgood Marshall (Region 12). Div. IV: Gnadenhutzen Indian Valley (Region 15). Div. VI: Youngstown Christian (Region 21) and Arcadia (Region 22).

Dayton Thurgood Marshall and Youngstown Christian were the only two newcomers to advance to the second round. In doing so, the schools picked up their first OHSAA playoff victory. Both schools were defeated in the second round leaving no newcomers left in the 2011 football playoffs.

The number of first-time participants since 2000 by year include eight in 2011, six in 2010, 14 in 2009, 12 in 2008, 14 in 2007, 10 in 2006, 12 in 2005, 16 in 2004, 12 in 2003, 21 in 2002, 17 in 2001 and 26 in 2000.

**GLAD TO HAVE YOU BACK:** Four schools returned to the playoffs after suffering long droughts: Sugarcreek Garaway (1994), Louisville St. Thomas Aquinas (1988), Wintersville Indian Creek (1996) and The Plains Athens (1990).

Sugarcreek Garaway and Louisville St. Thomas Aquinas, which had advanced to round two, were defeated in their regional semifinal game.

**WEEK 10 MOVERS:** As usual, there were a number of playoff spots decided during the final weekend of the regular-season. The following schools were not in the top 8 in their region at the end of week 9 but gained a playoff berth with a win in week 10: Whitehouse Anthony Wayne, Mason, Centerville, Chesterland West Geauga, East Cleveland Shaw, Tiffin Columbian, Columbus Brookhaven, Harrison, Hamilton Ross, Cincinnati Taft, Louisville St. Thomas Aquinas, Columbiana, Cincinnati Summit Country Day, Cleveland Villa Angela-St. Joseph, Glouster Trimble and Lockland.

Several schools also were ranked in the top eight after week nine but still got bumped from the playoffs despite their week 10 win: Avon Lake (Region 2), Cincinnati LaSalle (Region 4), Mount Healthy (Region 8), New Richmond (Region 12), Southern (Region 17) and Waynesfield-Goshen (Region 24).

**2010 STATE CHAMPIONS:** Four of the six defending state champions were back in the playoffs to defend their title. Those four schools were Lakewood St. Edward (7-3) in Division I, Maple Heights (8-1) in Division II, Columbus Bishop Hartley (9-0) in Division IV, and Delphos St. John's (7-3) in Division VI. In Div. III Columbus Bishop Watterson (3-6) finished 13th in Region 10 and in Div. V Youngstown Ursuline (4-6) finished 10th in Region 17 and did not qualify.

No returning state champions made it to a 2011 state title game. Delphos St. John's was the only returning champion to make it to a state semifinal. The Blue Jays were defeated by Maria Stein Marion Local 21-14 in that game.

Maple Heights lost in the first round of the playoff, Lakewood St. Edward was defeated in the regional semifinals and Columbus Bishop Hartley was defeated in its regional final.

**STADIUMS TOP THE LIST:** Canton Fawcett Stadium and Massillon Paul Brown Tiger Stadium were named No. 1 and 10, respectively, among the nation's best high school football stadiums, as voted by ESPN.com in 2009. Massillon's Paul Brown Tiger Stadium was also recently named a "Famous High School Venue" by the National Federation of State High School Associations.

No.6 Cleveland St. Ignatius overwhelmed the previously celebrated defense of Pickerington Central, 34-13, to win the 2011 OHSAA Division I football state championship Saturday evening at Canton Fawcett Stadium in front of 12,181 fans. The win marks the 11th state title for the Wildcats and extends their record for the all-time state championships for one school. Newark Catholic and Youngstown Cardinal Mooney are tied for second with eight titles apiece. Central (11-3) takes home its school's second state runner-up trophy (2011, 2006) and suffers its first loss since Week 2.

The Wildcats (13-2), who missed the playoffs last year for the first time in 23 years, now have 61 wins and 12 losses for an 83.6 playoff winning percentage. The mark is second among all teams with 50 or more playoff games.

Entering the game, St. Ignatius knew they would be facing a Central defense that had only allowed 31 points in its previous four playoff games. That stat didn't faze the Wildcats, however, as they came out and put up 20 points in the first half alone. They were led in the game by senior quarterback Eric Williams, who threw for 297 yards on 19 of 31 passing. Junior wide receiver Conor Hennessey was on the receiving end of four of those tosses and totaled 103 yards for an average of 25.8 yards a reception. Williams also connected with senior wide receiver Jake Mooney seven times for 79 yards. Junior running back Tim McVey did the damage on the ground as he ran for 107 yards on 24 carries.

Central was led by senior quarterback Nick Jensen-Clagg, who threw for 280 yards on 21 of 38 attempts. His biggest targets for the evening were senior receivers Sebastian Smith and Jake Raymond. Smith caught four passes for 141 yards (a 35.2 yard average), while Raymond collected

64 yards on eight catches.

The Wildcats struck first in the game when Williams connected with senior wide receiver Tim McCoy for a 45-yard touchdown pass. Three plays later, St. Ignatius senior defensive back Adam North recovered a Central fumble and returned it 16 yards to set up a Tim Shenk 31-yard field goal with 6:19 remaining in the first. The All-Ohio senior kicker tacked on another three points with 1:09 remaining to put the Wildcats up 13-0 heading into the second quarter. Shenk's two field goals tied a Division I record for most field goals in a state final game.

St. Ignatius struck again in the second quarter with an eight-yard rushing touchdown by McVey, but the Tigers were able to respond on their ensuing offensive possession when Jensen-Clagg found senior wide receiver Roger Lewis for a 15-yard touchdown pass. The touchdown capped off a five-play, 78-yard drive for the Tigers and cut the deficit to 20-7. With 5:21 remaining on the clock, Central regained possession, setting up a screen pass to Smith, who turned it into a 75-yard touchdown run. Senior Billy Eakins helped Smith's effort with a critical block that brought the Tiger fans to their feet and cut the lead to 20-13 heading into halftime.

St. Ignatius recovered a Central fumble early in the third quarter and took over on Central's 28. Williams then found Hennessey on the next play for a 17-yard gain to help set up a McVey 1-yard rushing touchdown and extend the lead to 27-13 with 8:20 left in the third quarter. That score would stand until 3:50 left in the fourth when Williams found senior wide receiver Jake Mooney for a 40-yard touchdown pass that ultimately sealed the win for the Wildcats. No. 1 ranked Trotwood-Madison totaled 492 yards of offense to defeat fifth-ranked Avon, 42-28, in the 2011 OHSAA Division II championship game Friday at Massillon Paul Brown Tiger Stadium.

The Rams' Isreal Green broke four individual state championship records in the victory. The junior running back set records for most touchdowns in a game in all divisions (6), most rushing touchdowns in a game in all divisions (6), most points all divisions (36) and most rushing yards in a game for Division II (326).

As a team, Trotwood-Madison set the record in Division II title games with 492 yards of total offense. The mark places the Rams eighth on the all-time list for total offense in a championship game.

Together Trotwood and Avon set the Division II mark for most combined total yards in a championship game with 818, placing the game ninth on the all-time list for all divisions.

The game itself was a back-and-forth affair. The Rams held a 21 point advantage late in the first half, but Avon was able to cut the lead to seven by the end of the third quarter. In the 2010 championship game, Trotwood held a 19 point lead against Maple Heights and was unable to hold on to the lead.

Avon was opportunistic, scoring on an interception return in the first quarter and recovering an onside kick late in the third quarter, trying to keep pace with the Rams running attack, but ultimately fell short in its first trip to the state championship game. The Eagles finish as runner-up with a 13-2 record.

No. 10 Youngstown Cardinal Mooney held off a potential game-tying drive late in the fourth quarter by No. 7 Springfield Shawnee to win the 2011 OHSAA Division III football state championship game Friday at Canton Fawcett Stadium, 21-14. The Cardinals won their eighth state title, tying Newark Catholic for second most all-time team championships.

Mooney (11-3), making its 11th state final appearance, overcame 30 yards in defensive penalties in that last drive and took over on downs with 1:11 remaining in the game on the Cardinals' 17 yard line. The Cardinals rushed for 220 yards out of 272 total yards of offense. Senior running back Roosevelt Griffin led the Cardinals with 119 yards on 21 carries and one touchdown. P.J. Quinn, Mooney's senior quarterback, controlled the offense and rushed for two touchdowns. They were led defensively by the Associated Press Defensive Player of the Year, Courtney Love, who totaled a team-high 7.5 tackles.

Shawnee (14-1) was led by its senior quarterback, AP Offensive Player of the Year, Brad Jarzab, who was 10 for 29 passing for 122 yards and also rushed for 139 yards and both Braves' touchdowns.

Entering the game, the crowd expected two high-octane offenses to square off but instead saw a 0-0 tie at the end of the first quarter. The stalemate didn't last long, however, as Griffin rushed for a score on the first play of the second quarter to cap off a seven-play, 36-yard drive. Shawnee responded three minutes later when Jarzab had a 15-yard scoring run to tie the score 7-7.

The Cardinals responded as Roosevelt and junior running back Justus Ellis-Moore each rushed for 34-yard gains to set up a Quinn touchdown. Leading 14-7, Mooney junior Marcus McWilson then intercepted a Jarzab pass and ran it back before being shoved out of bounds at the Shawnee 18. Quinn eventually found the end zone again to take a 21-7 Mooney lead into halftime.

The third quarter was a repeat of the first quarter performance as neither team was able to put any points up on the scoreboard. With a little over six minutes remaining in the fourth, Shawnee faced a big third and seven when Jarzab was able to connect with junior Alex McCroy for a 13-yard gain. The Braves found the end zone again on a Jarzab seven-yard rush to cut the lead to seven, 21-14. After an unsuccessful onside-kick with 5:38 left, the Braves forced a punt which bounced into the end zone, setting up a 12-play, 63-yard drive that took them down to the Mooney 13. After a costly Shawnee false start on fourth and one, Mooney senior Ryan Farragher deflected a deep end zone pass to help seal the Division III state title for the Cardinals.

The 2011 appearance marked the sixth time in the last eight years the Cardinals have made it to the state finals. They improve their all-time tournament record to 56-17.

Unranked Creston Norwayne scored with 31-seconds left to upset No. 1 ranked Kenton, 48-42, to win the 2011 OHSAA Division IV state football championship Saturday at Massillon Paul Brown Tiger Stadium.

The state football title is Norwayne's first in school history. The Bobcats finish the season 14-1, setting a school record for wins in a season.

With just under three minutes to go in the game, Norwayne senior quarterback Adam Wallace and the Bobcats began an 80-yard touchdown drive capped off by a 31 yard Wallace throw to sophomore Kaleb Harris for the winning score.

In a hard fought, back and forth, title game there were six championship game records broken and two tied.

Norwayne and Kenton scored 13 touchdowns between them, tying a Division IV record, and were a combined 42 of 74 passing for 703 yards, setting Division IV championship game records in all three categories. Both teams also combined to score 90 points, which is third all-time in a championship game.

The Bobcats also tied a Division IV title game record, scoring seven touchdowns. In a game that was eventually decided by scoring late, Norwayne's defense set the tone early with constant pressure on the Wildcat offense. Bobcat sophomore defensive back Trevahn Beery intercepted a Wildcat pass twice in the first half.

The Bobcats' defense continued to keep the Wildcats out of rhythm the entire contest,

finishing with five sacks and eight tackles for a loss.

Norwayne's offense was led by Wallace, who individually accounted for 422 yards of offense. He completed 15 of 24 passes for 282 yards and four touchdowns, while rushing for 140 yards and three touchdowns. Harris was the beneficiary of five of Wallace's passes, totaling 137 yards and two touchdowns receiving.

In defeat, Kenton senior receiver Brice Fackler set the record for most touchdown receptions all-time in all divisions, pulling in four. Fackler finished the game with five receptions for 178 yards.

Kenton senior quarterback Maty Mauk broke a record previously held by his brother Ben for most touchdown passes in a Division IV championship game, throwing for five. His brother set the previous record of four, in a 2002 title game victory against Portsmouth West.

Mauk, recently named the 2011 Ohio Mr. Football by the Associated Press, finishes the season with 7,181 total yards and 92 touchdowns. The Wildcat quarterback completed 382 of 566 passes for 5,413 yards and 68 touchdowns while rushing 241 times for 1,768 yards and 24 touchdowns.

Mauk finishes his career as the Ohio and national leader in career passing yards (18,929) and touchdown passes (219).

The No. 4 Maria Stein Marion Local Flyers used a stellar offensive performance to soar past the unranked Buckeye Central Bucks, 61-21, Saturday afternoon in the 2011 OHSAA Division VI football state championship at Canton Fawcett Stadium. The win marks the fifth state title for Marion Local (11, 07, 06, 01, 00) while Buckeye Central takes home the runner-up trophy for the second time (11, 05).

Marion Local (13-2) was one of two Midwest Athletic Conference teams (Coldwater, Division V) to make the 2011 state tournament. With the Flyers' win, the MAC has now won 11 state titles in the last nine years. The 61-point outburst by the Flyers' also ties them for the third-most points scored in a championship game and the 82-combined points puts this game fifth all-time for most combined points scored in a championship game.

The Marion Local squad was led by its sophomore quarterback, Adam Bertke, who was responsible for 278 yards through the air on 14 for 19 pass attempts and four touchdowns.

Buckeye Central (12-3) was led by senior Adam Paynter, who ran for 115 yards on 11 attempts and scored two touchdowns. Paynter averaged 10.5 yards a carry. He received help from junior running back Michael Adkins, who earned 120 yards on 22 carries and a touchdown.

Marion Local used an impressive balance of passing and rushing in the first half as they totaled 274 yards of offense on 35 plays (189 yards passing, 85 yards rushing). The Flyers didn't waste any time establishing their senior running back, Jake Heitkamp, in the game as the All-Ohioan rushed on five of the first eight Marion Local plays and put the Flyers on the scoreboard just 2:30 into the game. Heitkamp would finish the game with 95 total rushing yards on 19 attempts. Marion Local scored its second touchdown off a fumble recovery when freshman Jacy Goettemoeller tackled the

Bucks' quarterback and allowed junior Alaric Keller to scoop up the football and race into the end zone to put the Flyers up two touchdowns. Not to be outdone by his younger brother, senior Kellen Goettemoeller and Bertke connected for a 13-yard touchdown to take a commanding 21-0 Marion Local lead into the second quarter. The second quarter was the Lee Pieron and Bertke show as the quarterback connected with his junior wide receiver for two touchdowns, one 17-yarder and one 11-yarder, to go up 34-0 at half.

The start of the second half began much like the first for the Bucks as they faced a fourth and 14 just a minute into the third and was forced to punt. Marion Local fumbled the punt return, however, and Buckeye Central junior Ryan Wilfer's recovery gave the Bucks new life. They marched down the field for a seven-play, 51-yard drive that was capped off by a Paynter 17-yard rushing touchdown (34-7). That drive marked the first time Buckeye Central had entered Flyer territory on the afternoon.

The Flyers would quickly quiet the Bucks, though, when Bertke connected with Pieron for a 48-yard touchdown, capping off a two-play, 60-yard drive, just 39 seconds later. The touchdown was Pieron's third of the day. With 3:44 remaining in the third, Heitkamp rushed for his second touchdown of the afternoon and increase the lead to 47-7. Four plays later senior Trevor Homan intercepted a Buckeye Central pass and ran it back for a touchdown. The 85-yard pick set a Division VI football state championship record, with the previous best being a 51-yard return by Shaun Tompkins of Mogadore in the 1996 championship. Two minutes into the fourth the Bucks found the scoreboard on a 1-yard Michael Adkins touchdown and again with 3:12 remaining on a Adam Paynter 23-yard run. Marion freshman J.
