MAPFRE Stadium in Columbus is hosting its 17th OHSAA state soccer championships in 2015. Home of the Major League Soccer Columbus Crew, the stadium seats over 20,000 spectators and was the first stadium built designated specifically for soccer in the United States. The 2015 championships marks the fifth year the stadium hosts six championship games, three divisions in boys and girls. The 2011 state soccer championships drew 13,535 spectators, setting the all-time record for the OHSAA state soccer championships.
