Chosen for Second All-Ohio
Grid Eleven.

JIM HEISER, center on last
fall's Mansfield high school
football team, received mention
on the second team in the first
all-Ohio scholastic football selec-
tions ever made in this state.

Heiser, a senior, was the only
Tyger to win a position on one of
the two teams chosen by the
Columbus Junior Chamber of
Commerce with the assistance of
100 football coaches and sports
writers.

However, Becker Jenkins cap-
tain of the Mansfield received
honorable mention.

TYGER STAR WINS HONOR

Dick Miller Picked for Tackle Berth on Coaches' Second All-Ohio Team.

Dick Miller, tackle on the 1934
Mansfield high school football
team, was honored with a position
on the second All-Ohio high
school team chosen by the Ohio
high school coaches' association.

Miller, a senior, was the only
member of any North Central
Ohio conference team to win rec-
ognition. Jim Heiser, a tackle on
the 1933 Tyger eleven, won a
line position on the All-Ohio sec-
ond team a year ago.

The first team was dominated
by Canton McKinley players.
Earl Haas, a tackle; Tut Allen, a
guard, and Red Halter, quar-
terback, represented Canton on the
first team.

TYGER GUARD WINS PLACE ON ALL-OHIO

Sophomore Gaylord Bucher Honored With Berth on Coaches' Team.

ONLY NCO STAR PICKED

Backfield of Schoolboy Club Includes Kreuger of Sandusky.

A N INEXPERIENCED but
A promising candidate three
months ago, Gaylord Bucher, 155-
pound "iron man" of the North
Central Ohio championship Mans-
field high school football team,
today held the highest honor that
can be bestowed on a schoolboy
athlete in Ohio.

Bucher, only a sophomore, to-
day held a place on the mythical
All-Ohio scholastic eleven, which
is selected annually by the Ohio

High schools coaches' association
of which Jimmy Aiken of Canton
McKinley is president.

The aggressive Tyger lineman
not only holds the distinction of
being the first Mansfield player
ever selected on the All-Ohio
team, but wins the unique honor
of being the only sophomore ever
selected for the team, as well as
the smallest man on the 1934
eleven.

Only one other Tyger ever re-
ceived mention on an all-star
scholastic eleven. Dick Miller,
now a freshman at Ohio U., was
honored on the second team last
year.

In addition, the midget guard
was the only Tyger, as well as
the only N. C. O. conference
player, to receive mention on
the team selected by the coach-
es representative of the various
scholastic sections of Ohio.

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Play Featured All Tyger Games.

BUCHER was outstanding in all
of the Tyger games, and gave
a gallant exhibition of courage in
the Sandusky affair in which he
played all of the second half with
a severe chest wound that necessi-
tated the application of eight
clamps.

He was a quick, hard-charging
guard, who played a slam-bang
type of football. He was unequalled
in the conference, both as an
offensive and defensive player.

Paired with Bucher at the
guards on the all-Scholastic team
is Claude White, 170-pound Ports-
mouth terror. Jim Whitten of
Akron South, on the second All-
Ohio last year and August Morn-
ingstar, powerful 185-pound cap-
tain of the sensational Massillon
club, are placed at the ends.

At the tackles, the team is bol-
stered by Nick Cannarozzi of the
championship Cleveland Collin-
wood eleven and Edward Mann of
the titular Toledo Central club.

Stoke Gill of Youngstown
Campbell Memorial was select-
ed as the center on the mythical
club in preference to such other
guards as Grass of Sandusky and Brady
Sullivan of Steubenville.

Team's Backfield Coach's Dream.

THE backfield is a coach's
dream. It possesses power-
ful, elusive triple-threat perform-
ers, all of whom were outstanding
on their particular teams.

The brilliant LaMar Krueger
of Sandusky is placed at quarter-
back, with Horace Hampton, a
colored lad of Steubenville, and
Pete Ballos of Canton McKinley
at the halfbacks. The fullback
assignment is given to Harold
Stapleton, Hamilton's triple-threat
and who ran rampant over south-
western Ohio gridiron this fall.

On the second team, the coaches

Rayen and Schneider, Ravenna,
ends; Wertman, Canton McKinley,
and Clair, Hamilton, tackles;
